



Ogden-Weber Battle Friday Aggies Play Here Saturday

Rivalry games will no doubt rule Friday afternoon at Lorin Park when the Ogden Tigers take on the Weber Normal gridders in their second annual grid contest. Both aggregations are primed for the struggle and some first class work on the part of the players of the two teams is expected to rule.

Last season the Weberites held the Ogden Tigers helpless until the final period. At the end of the third period the Weberites were leading 7 to 0. In the third period, however, the Tigers came back strong and chased over 27 points, holding the Weberites to their original score.

The result of that contest has tended to instill pepper and fight into the Weber stars and they are out to avenge the 1919 Tiger machine according to Coach Watson.

Whether the Weber aggregation is victorious or whether the Tigers are the winners, it will be some battle from present indications it should be one of the best and most hotly contested of the season.

Captain Sreen of the Tigers star back and Paetsch star tackle, will be back in the lineup this week. These two men are considered two of the best on the Tiger eleven. Coach Peterson is working his men hard for the contest and is confident of victory.

Claude Lindsay, star back of the Weber aggregation will be on deck in the Ogden game. He is one of the main plays of the Blue and White eleven.

Assemblies will be held at both schools during the week to create interest and from all indications, from fans and students—will be some contest.

Saturday afternoon the grid fans of the city will have an opportunity of seeing a firstclass contest when the first Utah Aggie Fresh eleven vies with the Ogden A. A. stars on the gridiron.

Thus far this season the Freshmen at the Aggie school have been undefeated and they have met some of the best teams in the state and in Idaho. They defeated the best Logan High school eleven 14 to 9 in a recent game, the Loganites having one of the best High school machines in the state. They scored six points on the wonderful East High machine and held the Leopards to 35 points in their contest. A comparison of scores would indicate that the Fresh are just as strong as the Leopards.

The A. A. stars are back in top and working hard for the coming contest and also for the game with the Utah Freshmen to be staged here Armistice day.

New formations and new plays are being framed by the locals to spring on the Aggie aggregation and from information received from the north the Aggies will present a stiff well-oiled machine.

Coach McDonald will bring twenty players on the trip and has hopes of winning the contest.

Officials for this game have not been named as yet but they will be named during the week. It is probable that the Utah school will referee and Sam Olson will umpire, with Malcolm Watson as headlinesman.

The kickoff is set for 3 o'clock Saturday.

UTAH GRIDDERS COME TO TERMS

Aggies and Utah Will Meet at Salt Lake Thanksgiving; Meet in Ogden

The squabble between the University of Utah and the Utah Aggies, concerning the playing of the Thanksgiving day game assumed yesterday at a meeting between representatives of the two institutions, together with members of the arbitration board held at the Weber school.

At the meeting it was agreed that the contest this season would be played in Salt Lake with the "C" officials in charge of the game. New year the Aggie will have claims of the game which will be staged in Ogden, Salt Lake or Logan. The following year the contest will be staged at Salt Lake.

Will H. Pollard, Evan F. Owen and Ralph E. Bristol over the men present, named recently on the arbitration board. These men, together with Professor Ray West, Dr. Frank West and H. C. Hagg, of the Aggies, and Professor A. L. Hildner, Dr. H. L. Marshall and T. M. Fitzpatrick of the "C" completed the list of officials present.

For more than two months the contest has been hanging on the doubtful, neither aggregation being willing to concede any ground to the other. With the matter now settled, grid fans of the state will no doubt see a first-class contest when the two eleven meet.

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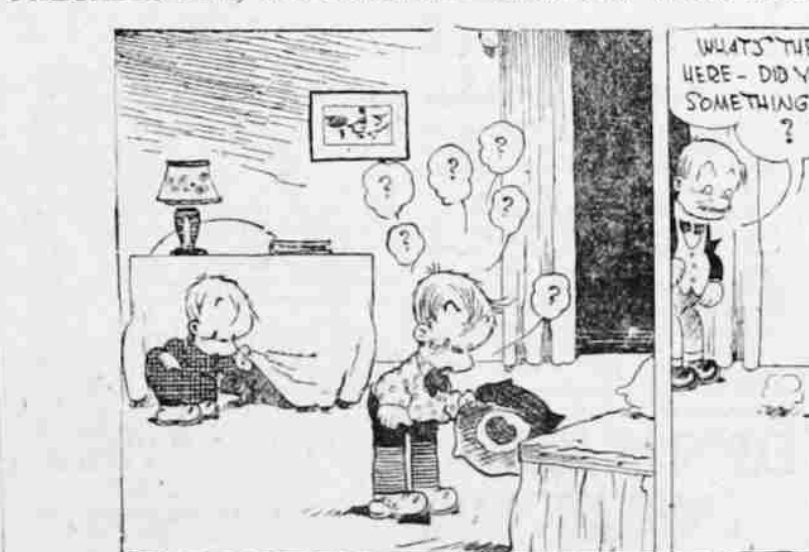
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
