G. O. P. ELECTORAL VOTE 404 JAPAN TO PROTEST CALIFORNIA ACT

REPUBLICANS GIVEN RECORD PARTY MARGIN

Victors to Have 287 in Lower House to 137 Democrats
SENATE MAJORITY WILL BE 59 TO-37
Belated Returns May Enlarge Upon Success of G. O. P. in Election

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—With the size of President-Elect Harding's electoral vote virtually settled at 404 out of a possible 531 and the complexion of the new senate set down as 59 Republicans and 37 Democrats, Republican leaders today awaited belated returns on eight contests in six states to fix the exact size of the Republican house majority.

Exclusion of the eight undetermined seats in the lower house, the Republicans had 247 members to 127 Democrats and four of other designations, a plurality of 150—the greatest ever held by any party in the house. The nearest approach to it was in the 1912 second congress, when the Democrats had a lead of 138.

RECORD PARTY MARGIN.
Republicans appeared to be assured of better than an even break on the eight undetermined seats which would give them a record party margin in the house. The seats still in doubt were the fourth Maryland district, eighth Missouri district, 15th, 21st, and 22nd New York, and first North Dakota.

A further possible Democratic upset appeared possible in the fourth Tennessee district where W. P. Clause, Republican, was reported to have forged slightly ahead of Cordell Hull, earlier reported elected.

Yesterday's count in Oklahoma voters of the nation's new women voters one representative in the lower house—Miss Alice Robertson, of Muskogee, a farmer and restaurant owner, Miss Robertson was an out-suffragist prior to the adoption of the nineteenth amendment, and made the congressional race "to see if the men meant it" when "they thrust the vote on us."

DEBATE IN HOUSE
LONDON, Nov. 4.—In the house of commons today T. P. O'Connor raised a debate by attacking what he described as the authorities policy of intransigence in Ireland, which he declared was adding new battalions to the Sinn Fein army and besmirching England's good name.

Slayer of Sheriff Expresses Regrets On Salem Scaffold

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 5.—Emmett Baneroff, alias Neil Hart, was hanged here today for the murder of Sheriff Til Taylor during a jail break at Pendleton, Ore., July 25. Baneroff's execution was the first in Oregon since capital punishment was restored by popular vote last May.

"I regret what I have done," were Baneroff's last words. "I feel that God is on my side and I am not afraid to go when He calls me."

GOMPERS SAYS RESULTS PROVE POWER OF LABOR

Foes of Workers Lose Out at Election: Friends Win, He Asserts
WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—(By the Associated Press.) Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, declared today in his state-of-the-art address that the results of the election "prove the power of labor."

"But democracy will right itself at the proper time," said Mr. Gompers, "and in the meantime the tabulation of results in congress, the law-making body, shows a definite and specified gain for all that makes for progress and responds to the needs of our time."

Mr. Gompers asserted that every man in the house whose "record of service was perfect had been re-elected" and added that the next congress would show an increased number of men who hold union cards.

Referring to the congressional elections, Mr. Gompers said: "Incomplete checking already showed that 'fifty congressmen who were inconsiderate and hostile have been defeated.'"

There was talk of a lynch mob when the men were taken to the jail, and on the first night the men were in the jail, a crowd gathered and ropes were seen in the glare of the moonlight. "Franklin W. Jinks," Taylor, brother of the sheriff, told the crowd that he would not have favored such violence.

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NIPPON PLANS TO TAKE CASE TO WASHINGTON

Tokio to Claim Exclusion Measure Violates Treaty Rights
FORMAL NEGOTIATION WILL FOLLOW PROTEST
Former Premier Says Only Thoughtless People Talk of War Over California

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—Call was issued today for a meeting here November 15 of the executive committee of the Japanese Association of America "to determine what course the association shall follow as the result of the operation of the new anti-alien law in California." The association is said to represent 60,000 Japanese in California, Utah, Nevada and Colorado.

TOKYO, Nov. 4.—(By the Associated Press.)—When confirmation has been received that the people of California have voted in favor of the proposed law in that state, Japan will lodge a protest in Washington, pointing out that the measure conflicts with Japanese treaty rights, according to the Yuzuru Choho, an independent organ which quotes a foreign official to this effect.

Formal negotiations, the newspaper says, will follow and an agreement permanently removing the cause of the trouble.

ARGUMENT REPORTED.
The Hoshi Shimbun reports that M. Shidehara, Japanese ambassador in Washington, and Secretary of State Colby have reached an agreement by which Japan will stop immigration to the United States, in return for which America will accord Japanese in America the same treatment as other foreigners.

JUSTICE EXPECTED.
"If Japan fights with arguments of dignity and impartiality," he is quoted as saying, "Americans will act justly." The district attorney, who is attributed by Marquis Okuma to the league of nations which he declares "even Democrats dislike." He does not anticipate the Republican administration will raise the tariff owing to economic difficulties.

VIEWED AT WASHINGTON.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—Formal protest by Japan against the adoption of the anti-alien law by California would be a usual course in diplomatic procedure, according to international law. Such action, it was explained, would be comparable to the filing of an objection by an attorney in the hearing of a law suit and the effect would be to safeguard Japan's position in the diplomatic exchange.

HARDING READY TO LEAVE MARION FOR VACATION

President Elect Tells Throng of Celebrants That League Is Deceased

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—(By the Associated Press.)—President-Elect Wilson today directed Secretary Daniels to place a battleship at the disposal of President-Elect Harding for his contemplated visit to the Panama canal zone.

Mr. Daniels to offer Mr. Harding the use of the presidential yacht Hawthorn to convey him and the members of his party to Hampton roads to go aboard the battleship.

MARION, O., Nov. 5.—In final preparation for his first real vacation in months, President-Elect Harding today disposed of the last remaining business of his campaign headquarters here and virtually abandoned the headquarters building which has housed his office and campaign assistants since July.

As Mr. Harding began his last day's work in Harding campaign headquarters, workmen were cleaning from the Harding lawn next door demolished standards and burned out red fire torches of last night's celebration, in which several thousand of his neighbors in Marion and nearby cities paid him a tumultuous tribute as the successful presidential candidate.

LEAGUE CALLED DEAD.
In his speech to the cheering crowd that gathered for his post-election front porch speech the new president-elect pronounced the league of nations "deceased," although by an historic coincidence a crowd was gathered at the same hour on the White House lawn in Washington acclaiming the league in the presence of President Wilson.

WILL CALL COUNCIL.
Soon after his vacation trip, which is to end early in December, Mr. Harding is expected to take preliminary steps toward a consultation of "statesmen," which he has promised throughout the country for formulation of America's program toward a world peace association. Whether he actually will assemble such a council before his inauguration, however, is regarded as doubtful.

Woman Sheriff Officer Shot Names Husband AS HE MOTORS; MORE REPRISALS

Unofficial Attempts Underway to Solve Irish Question Reported

ROSCOMMON, Mich., Nov. 5.—Mrs. Jane Johnson, 65 years old, mother of three children and sheriff-elect of Roscommon county, today outlined the platform on which she will go into office next January, succeeding Sheriff Johnson, her husband.

"I can't hand a bad man or bad woman if necessary," she said, "but as a matter of precaution I will appoint my husband deputy. In the intervals between searching for and caring for prisoners I will look after my children—two girls and a boy—and the domestic duties in my county jail."

Mrs. Johnson added that in case it should become necessary for her to "arrest a bad man he will know someone has been after him."

The sheriff-elect gained her experience from her husband, who has been sheriff for the past six years, and whom she married forty years ago.

BALLOTS FOUND IN NEW YORK'S SEWERS; FRAUD PROBE BEGUN
NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—District Attorney Edward Swann today began formal investigation of alleged frauds in Tuesday's election. As a result of the finding of twenty-six marked ballots yesterday in sewers of the 12th election district of the fourth assembly district, Mr. Swann summoned the election officials of that district to his office to be questioned.

Meanwhile the street cleaners of that and other districts were directed to search sewers and other places of possible concealment for missing ballots. Other alleged irregularities were reported.

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NENAGH, County Tipperary, Ireland, Nov. 5.—Lieutenant Hamilton was shot dead while motorcycling near here last evening. Two men who were arrested on suspicion of having killed him attempted to escape and were shot dead.

Reprisals followed the officer's death. Licensed premises and a printing office were destroyed by fire and a creamery was blown up with bombs and the machinery smashed.

The inhabitants of Nenagh fled into the surrounding country. The noise of firing and the explosions were heard throughout the night.

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ST. LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 5.—Miss Edna Ellis, 18 years old, was found mysteriously slain in a clump of weeds in a vacant lot in the northern section of the city today. Her throat had been slashed, and a broken razor was found near the body. She was a stenographer.

The girl had been beaten severely. Both eyes were discolored and her left jaw was swollen. The body bore numerous marks of maltreatment.

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TWO BABES PLAYING WITH MATCHES BURNED TO DEATH IN MICHIGAN

KIPPLING, Mich., Nov. 5.—Rudolph and Flaroon Ploetz, age 4 and 2, respectively, were burned to death here yesterday while playing with matches.

WHAT OF "BATH HOUSE" JOHN AND ALSO "HINKY DINK," CHICAGO ASKS

CHICAGO, Nov. 5.—The decision of Chicago's voters to have one alderman and fifty wards instead of two aldermen and 25 wards, today brought to light the interesting case of "Bath House" John, Coughlin and "Hinky Dink" Kenna, who have lapsed the First ward for more years than many voters can remember. Speculation was rife in political circles as to which of these celebrities would drop out at the time of the next election. They are fast friends.

ANTI-VIVISECTION ACT FAILS IN CALIFORNIA

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 5.—California voters declined Tuesday to adopt prohibitive measures prohibiting vivisection and compulsory vaccination, on the face of returns compiled last night.

SOCIALISTS CLASH WITH LIBERALS OF YUCATAN

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 5.—Serious clashes between Socialists and Liberals incident to the Yucatan state election campaign are reported in dispatches from Merida. Assertion is made that the Socialists, who are dominant in that state, have employed troops to suppress demonstrations. The election will be held on December 1.

15,000 WORKERS TO BE IDLE AS OVERLAND AUTO FACTORY CLOSES

TOLEDO, O., Nov. 5.—Today announcement was made here that the Willys-Overland automobile plant, normally employing around 15,000 workers, will shut down tomorrow for inventory and will remain closed for an indefinite period.

SWEDISH SHIP OWNER OPENS LINE TO CHILE

VALPARAISO, Chile, Nov. 4.—Alexander Johnson, the Swedish millionaire ship owner, president of the Johnson line of steamers, arrived today on board one of his own vessels and announced plans for fortnightly sailings of the steamers of his line between Sweden and Chile. Mr. Johnson will proceed to the northern countries of South America and thence to San Francisco.

SCHOOL PRINCIPAL SHOT FOR WHIPPING STUDENT

MIDDLESBORO, Ky., Nov. 5.—Prof. Harner, principal of the Middlesboro high school, was shot and fatally wounded Thursday by Adolph Oakes.

It is reported Professor Barnes whipped Oakes' sister, a high school student, last Thursday. Barnes had tendered his resignation and intended leaving the city Saturday. Oakes is in jail.
