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LABOR CABINET SPEEDS DATE OF CONFERENCE
Utmost Privacy Insisted Upon as Union Leaders Plan Meeting

GUARDS TO BE POSTED
Question of General Strike May Be Considered By Leaders

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 5.—The situation developed by the strike injunction, obtained by the government has caused the executive conference of the American Federation of Labor to make reservations for a private suite facing the sea on the ninth floor of the Ambassador here, where they will take possession tomorrow.
