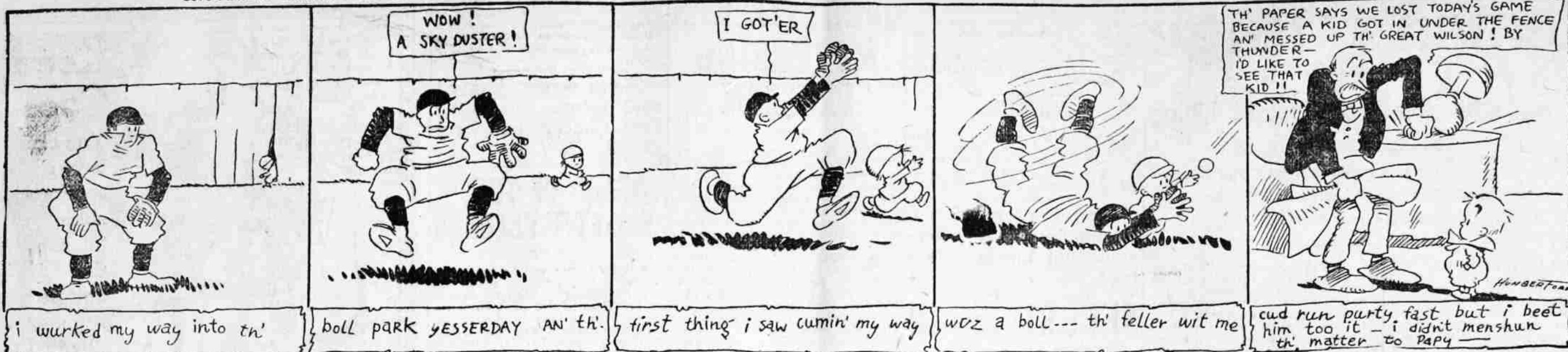

OGDEN WINS FAST GAME

Local Boys Find Maloney Easily and Often—Knight Allows Eleven Hits—Good Fielding Wins the Game

Missoula, June 20.—Ogden won the fourth game of the series from Missoula today, 6 to 2. The pitching of Mike Maloney just suited the Ogden men. They jumped on him in the first inning, chasing three runs across the plate. With Weesler and Jones on the sacks, Risberg sent them in with a three-base hit to left field, and Risberg scored on a clean hit by Moorehead. Ogden scored again in the second inning. Pourroy singled to right, advanced on two outs and scored on Van's single to left. Ogden scored a run in the seventh and one in the ninth on clean hitting and an error by Morse.

Missoula made her run in this way: In the second inning Carman singled to left and scored on a double by Daschbach. The Highlanders added one more in the sixth on a double by Carman followed by Tobin's single, and scored in the eighth on hits by Sorenson and Bassey.

Risberg and Murray played fine ball all the way. Ogden presented a switch in its lineup and the change worked fine today.

Manager Blankenship has offered to trade Carman and Bassey to Ogden for First Baseman Van and the trade may go through.

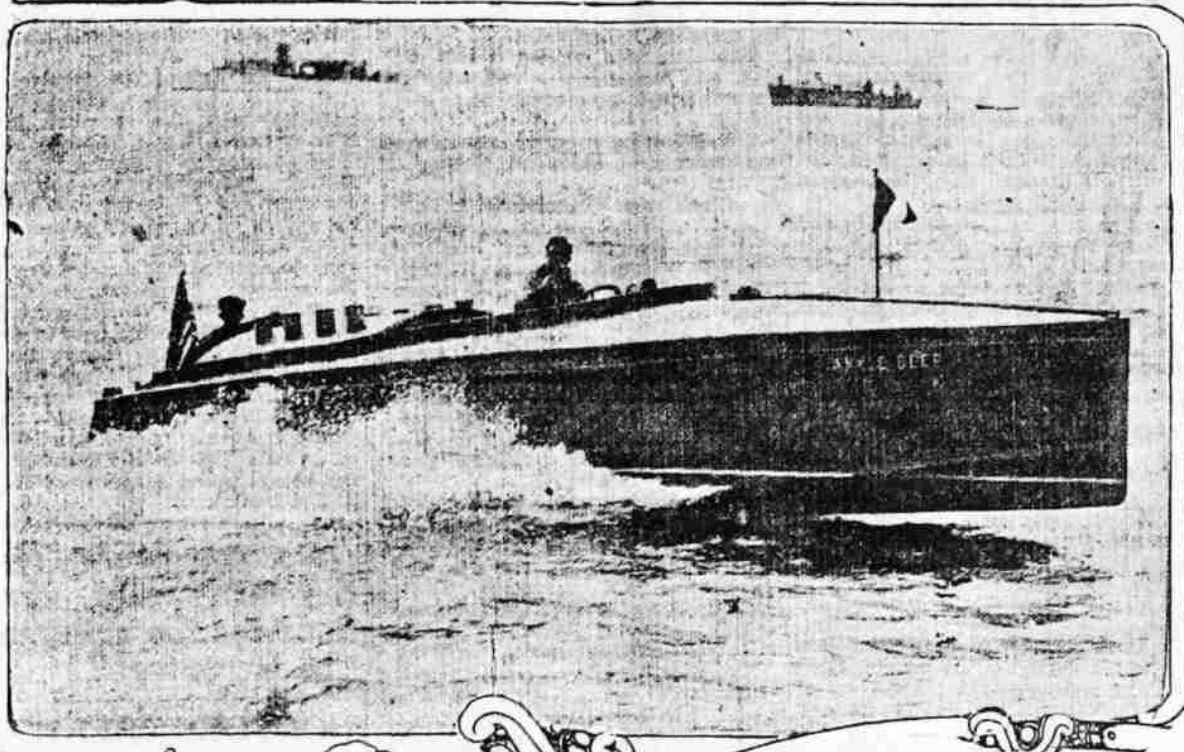
HELENA AGAIN DEFEATS BUTTE

INTERNATIONAL TROPHY WILL TRY TO WIN BACK

New York, June 21.—The dates for the elimination trials for the selection of a team of three boats to represent the United States as challengers for the British international motor boat trophy, also known as the Harmsworth trophy, have been set by the Motor Boat club of America for July 7, 8 and 9. High power speed boats from the Great Lakes will strive for a place on the team. Prominent motor boat enthusiasts of Seattle, Wash., have also entered a specially constructed water flyer. While a number of wealthy easterners also com-

missioned famous boat builders to construct would-be cuplifters, designed after their own particular ideas.

One boat which seems certain of winning a place on the American team is Count Casimir S. Mankowski's "Ankle Deep." During last year's contests at Huntington bay, which resulted in England winning back the famous cup, "Ankle Deep" was leading entering the last leg of the 30-knot course when she broke down. She was officially timed at the end of 22½ miles in 34:52, which is at the

rate of 38.72 nautical miles, or 44:58 statute miles per hour.

The races for the Harmsworth trophy will be held during the second week of August. And it is the intention of the American Motor Boat club to have Uncle Sam's entries on the other side in time to give them ten or twelve days running over the course over which the races are to be held.
