SALT LAKE AND STATE NEWS

SIX SMALL BOYS ARE PICKED UP BY POLICE

All Apparently Had Run Away From Their Homes Without Parents' Knowledge.

Salt Lake, March 25.—Six little boys, ranging in age from 3 to 14 years, were picked up by Patrolman J. J. Riley at the Oregon Short Line depot shortly before 11 o'clock Wednesday evening, while attempting to board the baggage car of No. 9 over the Oregon Short Line for the north. The boys were traveling, it developed, in two distinct parties of three members each.

Patrolman Riley noticed three small boys hanging around the baggage car, and upon inquiring of them where they were going, they told him that they were on their way to Blackfoot, Ida., and that their homes were in Eureka. The officer took them to the baggage room at the station and was there met by the baggage clerk, who informed him that three other little boys were also hanging around the train.

Patrolman Riley found them and they told him they were on their way home to Bountiful. He took this trio to the baggage room also and sent for the patrol wagon and the two parties were taken to police headquarters. The boys from Eureka gave the names of Stanley Householder, aged 10 years; George Gray, 13, and Horatio Bowen, 13, and said that they were on their way to young Gray's sister's home in the Gem state. When they left home, they said, they had \$5, but had spent it for candy and eatables. When asked how they were planning to get to Blackfoot they informed the police they had intended riding in the baggage car. They said that they had been informed that they could get work in Idaho Falls, and had left without the consent of their parents.

The boys from Bountiful, whose names are Willie Lee, aged 9 years; Howard Phillips, 11, and Marvius Wright, 13, said they had come to Salt Lake Wednesday morning to obtain work. They declared that a man by the name of Carl Walker had promised them jobs, but when they arrived they failed to find Walker and were stealing their way home when found. The six youngsters were placed in the boys' ward at the city jail.

Immediately Lieutenant John Hempel notified the officers of both Bountiful and Eureka and they promised to find the boys' parents and take the matter up with them.

"VOICES OF DEAD" COMMAND SILENCE

Mrs. Hattie Hunter Buettler Refuses to Answer Questions of Commission.

Salt Lake, March 25.—When Hattie Hunter Buettler of Tenth South and Eleventh West streets, widow of Fred Buettler, an umbrella mender, who was murdered and robbed of \$1,000 by as yet unidentified assassins, in 1897, was arraigned before an insanity commission in Judge Lewis' division of the district court Wednesday morning to determine her mental condition, she declared that voices of the dead were calling to her telling her to say nothing, and refused to answer all questions.

Unable to get Mrs. Buettler to talk about herself, the commission postponed further investigation until 10 o'clock this morning. It is the general belief, however, that the unfortunate woman has lived in the shadow of a tragedy so long—twelve years—that her reason has been impaired.

Mrs. Hunter has been acting strangely for a long time. At night she leaves her bed, dresses and wanders about the streets. Three weeks ago she got up late at night, and expressed a strong desire to go to the church in Cannon ward for prayer. Another time she went away from home at night and was found by the sheriff's force, wandering aimlessly around. This time she was taken to the home of her daughter, Mrs. Mary Maycroft. Since then she has been in such a bad condition mentally that it is hard for her children to control her.

Mrs. Buettler was not at home at the time the murder of her husband, it is said. Buettler was overpowered in his own house and was forced into his throat until he suffocated, and then the robbery was committed. Four or five years ago Abe Hunter, Mrs. Buettler's first husband, from whom she is divorced, made a so-called confession that he and Mrs. Buettler, with two accomplices, murdered Buettler, and the case was reopened, but the state was unable to corroborate the "confession" and the case was dismissed.
