HANSON ON TRIAL FOR **ARSON**

Before Judge John A. Marshall in the United States district court Thurs-day, the trial of Frank Hanson, for-mer postmaster of Fillmore, Utah, on the charges of theft of the United States mail and stamps and the destruction of government property by the postoffice, was begun. This case has become quite celebrated in the legal annals of Utah, because of the many peculiar circumstances and incidents surrounding it, and the fact that the defendant is a brother of Willard Hanson, former county attorney and George Hanson, secretary to Unit ed States Senator George Sutherland. Hanson appeared in court, accom-

anied by his brother Willard. The first witness called was J. C. Kelly, present postmaster at Fillmore, who testified that Hanson came to the postoffice about 4 o'clock on the afternoon of the day of the fire. He was about to close the postoffice when Hanson called and offered to put up the shutters on the outer window. This the postmaster refused. Then he took the postmaster to a room in the rear to show him where a lock had been broken by a burglar and he sightseeing, side trips to the foot-seemed to take a good deal of notice hills and to the splendid mountain

of the arrangement of the rooms. Miss Hazel Beauregard of Fillmore was the next witness and she told of having mailed a letter to her brother in Salt Lake City on the afternoon of the day the postoffice was burned. She was shown a letter and identified it as the one she mailed and said she

thought it was "burned in the fire." In the opening statement it was announced that the Beauregard letter was found in Hanson's house. Former Sheriff Black said on hear-ing the alarm of fire he ran to the

postoflice and tried to enter the buildpostonice and tried to enter the building, but the fire was too strong. He then tried to get to the window so that he could get records that were kept on a table near it, but the flames urst out and he was driven back. Sheriff Black, under cross-examin ation, said he met Hanson the day af-ter the fire. He was indignant and intimated that the sheriff had made a statement that "he had burned up the postoffice." This the sheriff de-

Some Damaging Testimony. Ira Warner, a young man about 20, was next called and he gave some damaging testimony. He stated that about 11:30 on the night of the fire, about half a block from the postoffice, he met Hanson. Hanson was not dressed up as usual. He wore a slouch hat pulled down over his eyes, his coat collar was pulled up, he wore no collar or tie, and witness had never seen him dressed that way before. Twice the witness said, "Good evening" to Hanson and got no reply. Then he grabbed his hat and recog-nized the former postmaster. Hansen told Warner to "mind his own business." He walked with Hanson to the end of the block and the latter said he was going to Lon Huntsman's. The witness replied that Sheriff Roley found letters on the top of a cupboard that were posted the night of the fire. There were ten letters in all. He was shown the letters and identified them, one being addressed to Joe Beauregard, Salt Lake City.
