THOMPSON  
KNOCKS OUT  
SULLIVAN

"Cyclone" Johnny Thompson of Sycamore, Ill., unassuming, quiet and always a gentleman, won the respect and admiration of 5,000 fight fans at the Saltair hippodrome, last night, when he knocked out Pete Sullivan of Fall River, Mass. While Thompson had a hundred rooters from Ogdien from beginning to end, within ten minutes after his aggressive and hard fighting against the "Pride of Utah," who was very much on the defensive, Thompson began winning over the Salt Lake fans. When the left-hand swing knockout blow was delivered in the ninth round and the "Pride of Utah" was still on the floor, after the ten count, then the "Pride of Sycamore" was given an ovation, the like of which has never been given any fighter in the state.

From the tap of the gong in the first round to the ninth round, Thompson was doing all the fighting. Sullivan would crouch and hang on and cover his face with his arms. In the second round Thompson had his man almost out but Sullivan was saved by the gong. From the second round to the end of the go, Sullivan plainly showed that he would rather keep close to Thompson than have a repetition of the second round.

In the ninth round the Sycamore had started fighting from the tap of the gong and came on so fast that the Fall River boy had no time to recover from the "cyclone" attacks, when the terrific left hand swing to the jaw was delivered.

As Battling Nelson telegraphed to Ogdien last week that he did not care to meet Thompson, as he did not think he could do justice to the public and himself, last night's victory puts Thompson in line to meet Ad Wolgast for the championship.

In the 296 battles Thompson has been in he has never been knocked out, but has met all the topnotchers in the lightweight class at different times and has scored victories over ninety-five per cent of them. It is evident that a match between Thompson and Wolgast will be arranged if Nelson still refuses to meet Thompson.

Kid Forbes, who disposed of Kid Opie by the knockout route in the third round. Up to that time the contest was fast and full of clean boxing.

Jack Downey made a hit with the crowd by knocking out Kid Frazzles in the first round of a four-round go.

Ogdien will soon be in the baseball swim.

A committee, composed of those well known baseball enthusiasts, Dad Glimin, Walter A. Sanderson and Angus Kennedy, circulated among the baseball fans yesterday and met with a high degree of success. Although the committee called upon but few of those known to be "good fellows,"

EXPERT DECIDES AS TO WHAT IS A SNAIL.

New York, May 12.—The question, what is a snail, is the latest subject to come before the attention of the board of United States general appraisers.

According to the varying opinions of tariff experts, as put before the board, the snail could be a live animal, "a shrimp," "a shellfish," or simply a raw or manufactured article.

But at last it has been decided that snails are "live animals" and as such cannot be admitted to this country free of duty.

"There appears to us to be an incongruity," says the learned appraiser in their report, "in treating a snail as a raw or manufactured article. We are not altogether clear that as assessment should be made under the provision for live animals, but it cannot be denied that the snail falls under the head of animal life rather than vegetable or mineral."

RANCHO DEL PASO IS SOLD TO A COMPANY.

Sacramento, May 12.—The Rancho del Paso, former home of the James B. Haggin string of thoroughbreds, has been sold by Haggin and Tevis heirs to a Minneapolis land company headed by George W. Butler.

The price paid by the purchasers is between \$1,500,000 and \$2,000,000. The ranch contains 44,000 acres.
