Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person, association or corporation to propel, or cause to be propelled, any street cars on the streets of the city and county of San Francisco with advertisements printed, pasted or painted on or attached to the outside of said cars.

Reed also presented a resolution calling the attention of the Board of Public Works and the Chief of Police to the provisions of the ordinance prohibiting the maintenance of fences more than ten feet in height and directing them to enforce its provisions. The resolution, which went to the Police Committee, follows:

Whereas, On June 25, 1800, this Board of Supervisors passed Ordinance No. 96 "Regulating the height and construction of fences of wood or other inflammable material within the city and county of San Francisco," and forbidding any such fences of a greater height than ten feet to be erected or maintained; and whereas, by section 3 of said ordinance such fences of over ten feet in height are declared a public work to the Board of Public Works, is directed to abate the same; now therefore be it Resolved, That the attention of the Board of Public Works and the Chief of Police is hereby called to the provisions of said Ordinance No. 96 immediately.



RICE'S MURDER

Give Some Damaging Testimony.

Preliminary Examination of the Four Defendants Commenced.

The preliminary examination of William Buckley, Thomas Moran, Charles Donnelly and Edward Duncan on the charge of murder for clubbing, shooting and killing George W. Rice, a non-union machinist, at Twentieth and Howard streets on the evening of October 11 was commenced be fore Judge Mogan yesterday. Buckley was represented by ex-Judges Ferral and Murphy, Moran by Attorney George D. was represented by ex-Judges Ferral and Murphy, Moran by Attorney George D. Collins and Donnelly by Attorney Hutton. The prosecution was represented by Attorneys Peter F. Dunne, Joseph F. Coffey and Assistant District Attorney Harris. It was decided to first take the evidence of W. J. Platt, 2496 Howard street, and his daughter Erline, as they had made arrangements to leave the city for some time. Platt was the first witness examined. He related getting on the car with his daughter and when it arrived at Twentieth and Howard streets a man who was in front of him on the dummy got off and met another man who got off the rear of the car and struck him on the head several times with a club, knocking him down. As the man who was knocked down lay on his back on the obblestones rolling his head from side to side another man went up to him and fired four shots into his body.
