

## SENATOR SANFORD AND OTHERS WANT HAYDEN REMOVED

Several California Democrats  
Say Special Prosecutor Is  
Friend of the Cami-  
netti Family

## PROTESTS MADE TO ATTORNEY GENERAL

Experience of Lawyer Ques-  
tioned by Those Who  
Object

WASHINGTON, July 15.—Vigorous protests against the retention of Thomas E. Hayden as a special prosecutor for the noted Diggs-Caminetti white slave cases in San Francisco were laid before Attorney General McReynolds today by Senator Ashurst at the request of several California democrats. They allege among other things that Hayden is a friend of the Caminetti family.

Senator Ashurst did not make public the names of the men at whose request he acted. They selected him to make the protest because California is not represented by a democratic senator. Another reason given to Senator Ashurst for desiring Hayden's removal as special attorney was his inexperience as a prosecutor.

Later Senator Ashurst stated that one of the protests against the selection of Hayden was State Senator J. R. Sanford of California.

At the department of justice Senator Ashurst took pains to say that he was not attacking Hayden personally, but only calling in question his experience as a prosecutor.

Attorney General McReynolds late today explained that Mr. Sullivan was the government's leading counsel in the Caminetti-Diggs case and that Mr. Hayden was an associate.

"I will examine the charges very carefully," said Attorney General McReynolds, "and if it is demonstrated that the special prosecutor is not the right man for the work we will get somebody else."

**Stanford Favors Costello**

SAN RAFAEL, July 15.—State Senator J. R. Sanford, on being asked today regarding his reported protest against the appointment of Thomas Hayden to prosecute the Diggs-Caminetti cases, stated that it was true that he had recommended to Attorney General McReynolds that Stephen B. Costello be appointed, as the most prominent man for the place.

However, he said, he had nothing personally against Hayden.

"But I understand," he added, "that Mr. Hayden has had no particular experience in the prosecution of criminal cases. I do not say that I oppose him. I think it will be sufficient if I say that I still favor the appointment of Mr. Costello."

## CAMINETTI-DIGGS TRIALS AUGUST 5

The trials of Drew Caminetti and Mary I. Diggs, charged with violating the white slave act, were set for August 5 by Judge William C. Van Fleet yesterday in the United States district court.

Special Prosecutor Matt I. Sullivan, representing the government, asked for the earliest possible date.

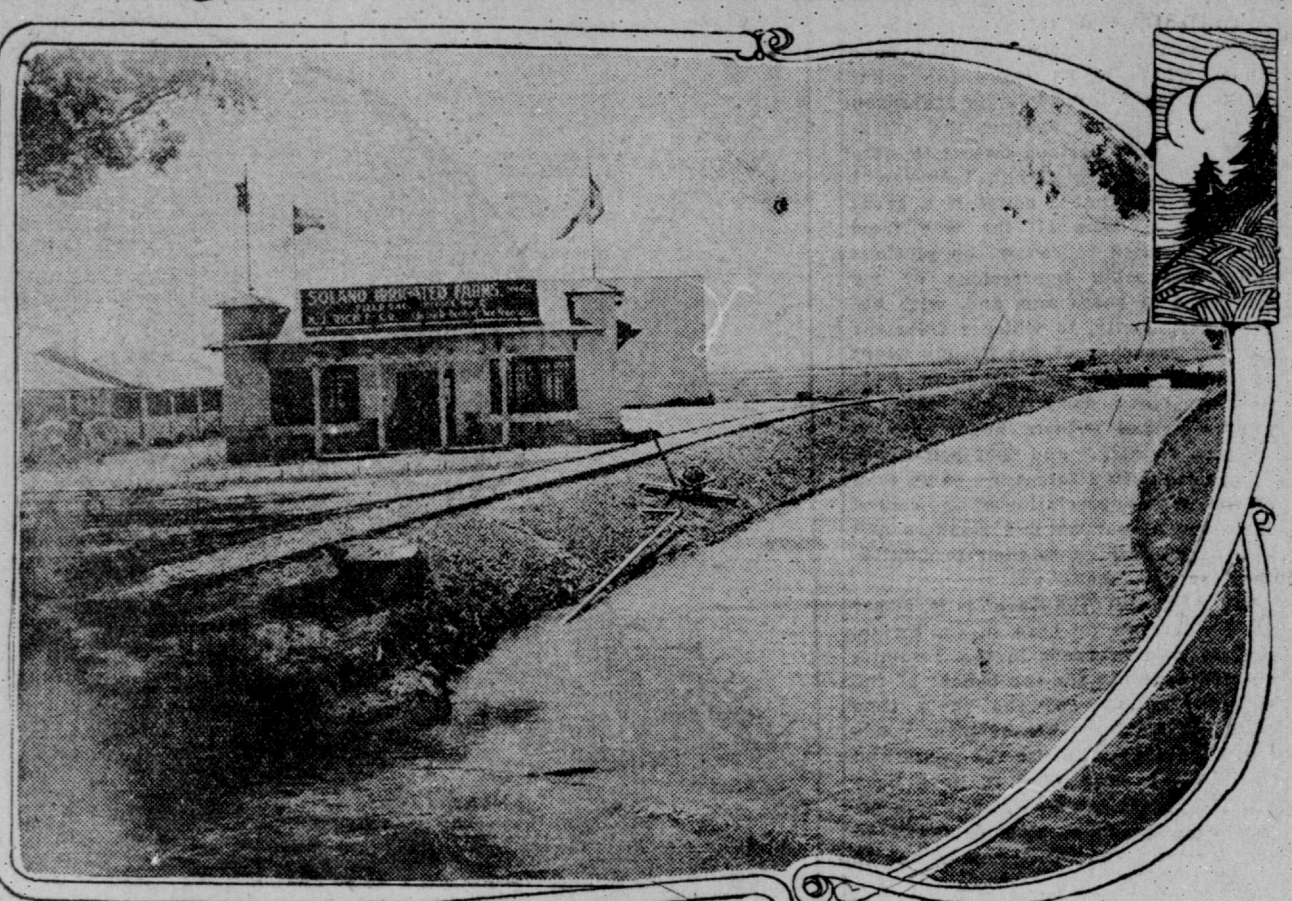
Caminetti and Diggs were in court for the first time since their arrest. Hitherto they had always been represented by counsel.

The trial of the directors and officials of the Western Fuel company was set for August 26, providing that a federal judge will be available at that time. All of the eight defendants were in court and, through their attorney, asked for an early trial.

Judge Van Fleet ordered a petit jury impaneled for August 5. A new grand jury was also ordered impaneled.

## CATERPILLARS WILL PLOW Engines Ordered for Solano Farms

The great irrigation canal of the Solano Irrigated Farms company, which will water 10,000 acres of fertile delta lands now being prepared for plowing.



## Land Company Buys Agricultural Leviathans With Which to Turn Sod of 120,000 Acres for Alfalfa

Twelve caterpillar engines have been ordered for plowing operations on Solano irrigated farms. The choice of this type, after a season's competition in a victory for home industry, as the caterpillar is manufactured in Stockton.

The battery of a dozen field leviathans is none too large for the Solano farms' demands, as the company intends to plow practically all of the 120,000 acres. All of the land now selling will be broken up for the buyers and the plowing, checking and planting of 10,000 acres to alfalfa will be pressed ahead.

None of the unsold land will remain idle, as the company will conduct its own farming operations on a vast scale and, besides profiting from the resultant crops, will be able to show what the soil of the whole area will produce. Some of this land has been

used for more than a quarter of a century as pasture for sheep and cattle. Not having seen it in crops some of the old timers had come to the conclusion that it was not productive land.

## HEAVY BARLEY CROP

To dispel the idea the company planted a corner of the Glendale ranch last spring and was rewarded with one of the heaviest crops ever raised in the valley. Sixty-five thousand sacks of grain were thrashed. The summer seeding of alfalfa, an experiment which caused the wisecracks to look askance, has proved a success. The fields first sown are already showing a remarkable young growth and every acre has been snapped up by the early buyers. About half of the installment purchasers took advantage of the company's alfalfa leasing plan, whereby the buyer gets one third of the crop for five years, the company

bearing all the expense of planting and cultivation. The fact that so many have not accepted the lease is taken as an indication that they will take possession of their farms immediately and develop them.

## SOWN TO ALFALFA

The dairy farms will be sown to alfalfa this season and the limited number of these tracts, ranging in size from 200 to 500 acres, will probably be quickly exhausted. Negotiations for three or four dairies are already pending on the company's offer to stock the farms with cows, to be paid for out of the profits.

Rich & Co. this week opened offices in Sacramento, Fresno, Stockton and Santa Rosa. The firm also announced the purchase of the Marcus Peterson 600-acre stock ranch and 640 acres from Caroline and William Powell, to be added to the Solano farms.

## SOLDIER DARES TIDE IN RESCUE

Artilleryman Nearly Drowns in  
Undertow While Dragging  
Comrade to Safety

Plunging into an undertow which was already fast sweeping his comrade out to sea, Fred Hess, musician of the coast artillery corps, saved P. M. Lohr, another musician, from drowning yesterday noon when the soldiers were swimming off Fort Scott.

Lohr got beyond his depth and became exhausted trying to fight his way back to shore.

Hess swam out after him and soon had a good hold on Lohr, but the pull back to land was so difficult that for a time it seemed as though both men would drown. Finally they got into shallow water, and they were taken to quarters. Hess was in nearly as bad shape as the man he had risked his life to rescue.

## CITIZENS ARE OPPOSED TO HIGH BILLBOARDS

Arguments Made to Supervisors by  
Advocates of "City  
Beautiful"

Supervisors Murdoch, Hayden, Gallagher and Payot of the public welfare committee listened to and participated in lively arguments over the applications made yesterday for more billboard space.

Representatives from various civic improvement clubs, owners of billboards and a gathering of interested citizens were present when Supervisor Payot opposed the applications.

Charles Francis Adams, secretary of the "City Beautiful" organization, argued against the granting of the permits and pointed out that San Francisco alone countenanced the disfigurement of its streets by the use of unsightly devices.

Supervisor Gallagher said many members of the "City Beautiful" organization rented property to owners of billboards, and they should cease so doing if they are sincere in their efforts to stint the growth of the industry.

## SECRET WEDDING DENIED BY MRS. WILL AND GRANT

Will Be Married Next Saturday  
and Begin World's  
Tour, Following Gen-  
eral Grant's Route

SAN DIEGO, July 15.—U. S. Grant Jr. of this city and Mrs. America Workman Will of Los Angeles today emphatically denied the persistent report that has been in circulation here and elsewhere to the effect that they were married about a fortnight ago, almost immediately after the issue of the license to Grant. Coupled with the positive denial of that story was their definite announcement of their plans for the wedding and subsequent tour of the world.

The ceremony, they say, will be performed next Saturday morning in the parlor of a local hotel and will be followed by a luncheon. The newly wedded pair will then take a train for San Francisco.

There they will embark on the first steamer sailing for Honolulu.

At the latter city they plan to remain several weeks. Then they will resume their journey, going to the Orient. It is their purpose to traverse, but from the opposite direction, substantially the route taken by General Grant in his tour of the world near the end of the 70's.

They also will spend some time in southern Europe and purpose to arrive in New York on the return journey in December, 1914. They expect to be in San Diego in January of 1915.

## DR. R. BREMER SMITH ACCUSED OF ASSAULT

Physician Who Escaped From Detention Ward Arrested on Charge  
Brought by James Cody

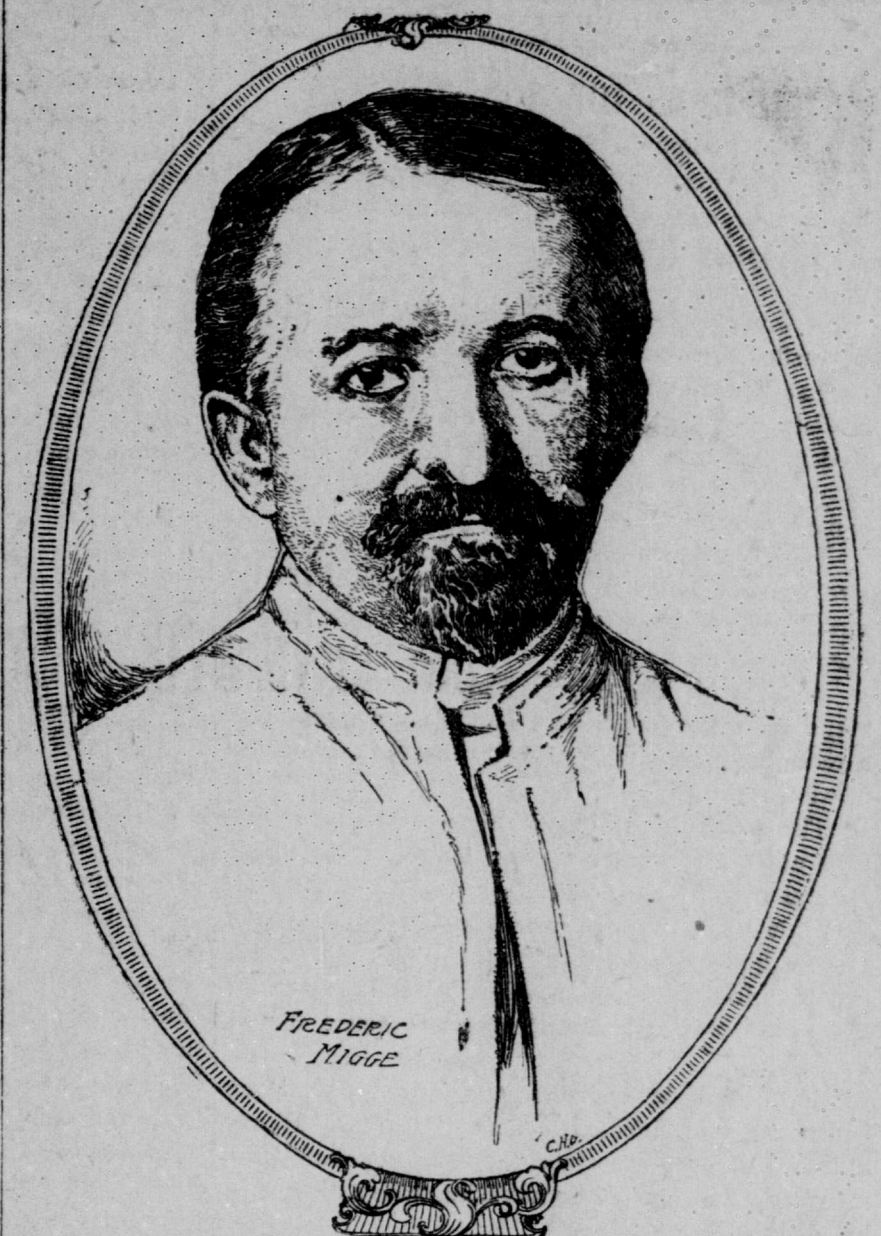
Dr. R. Bremer Smith, arrested some time ago on a complaint of Lincoln Savage, an attorney, and who escaped from the detention ward at the central emergency hospital, where he was being held for examination as to his sanity, was arrested yesterday on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon preferred by James Cody, a brother of former Detective Sergeant Cody.

The trouble between Cody and Smith is an outgrowth of the Savage and Smith dispute. The two men have property interests near Murray's road house, known as Seaciff, and Smith has been living on the property. Last Friday Savage gave Cody power of attorney to go to the Seaciff property and oust Smith. When Cody appeared there was trouble.

Cody says Smith cut him on the right wrist and put him off the land.

Smith gave himself up and is in jail, being unable to raise \$300 as bail.

I know the keen worry that is felt by every man or woman when the hair begins to show signs of falling out, and I know, too, what fortunes are being spent every day in trying the many 'hair tonics' that are fostered upon the public by dishonest manufacturers. I, myself, once upon a time, bought some of these 'hair tonics,' but I was in a position to analyze them and detect their injurious ingredients before making the mistake of applying them."

Persons living outside San Francisco and Oakland who are interested in the Migge treatments have been invited by the scientist to write to him. The bacteriologist is very desirous of having the benefits of his discovery spread over the entire world as fast as his laboratories, and the branch laboratories he plans to establish, can accomplish it. His reception rooms, on the seventh floor of The Call building, adjoining the laboratory, are now open to all who wish to consult him and to those who wish to see the action of the bacteria demonstrated.—Adv.
