The Committee recommend that following Resolutions which were drafted by the Committee on Privileges and Elections in 1841, be adopted and that the same be printed with the Acts of the Assembly, and also with the writs of Election, and that the Clerk of the two Houses be directed to cause the same to be forwarded to the Managers of Elections throughout the State.
