PLATFORM OF PRINCIPLES.

The National Union Convention now assembled in the city of Philadelphia, composed of delegates from every State and Territory in the Union, adnished by the solomn lessons which for the last ave years it has pleased the Supreme Ruler of the universe to give to the American people, pro-foundly grateful for the return of peace, desirons as are a large majority of their countrymen in all sincerity to forget and to forgive the peat, revering the Constitution as it came to us from our ances-tors, regarding the Union in the restoration as more

laws of any State to the contrary notwithstand-ing." All the powers not conferred by the Consti-tution upon the General Government, nor pro-hibited by it to the State, are reserved to the States or to the people thereof, and among the rights thus reserved to the States is the right to prescribe qualifications for the elective franchis therein, with which right Congress cannot interfere. No State or combination of States has the right to withdraw from the Union, or to exclude, through their action in Congress or otherwise, any other State or States from the Union. The union of these States is perpetual, and its government of supreme authority within the restrictions limitations of the Constitution.

United States may be made by the people theref as convention, and in ratifying the same, all the States of the Union have an equal and an indefeas

Ible right to a voice and a vote thereon.
7. Slavery is abolished and forever prohibited, and there is neither desire nor purpose on the part of the southern States that it should ever be reestablished upon the soil or within the jurisdiction of the United States, and the enfranchised slaves in all the States of the Union should receive, in com-mon with all their inhabitants, equal protection in

every right of person and property.

8. While we regard as utterly invalid and never to be assumed or made of binding force any obliincurred or undertaken in making was gainst the United States, we hold the debt of the nation to be sacred and inviolable, and we proclaim our purpose to maintain unimpeached the honor and the faith of the Republic.

9. It is the duty of the National Government to

recognise the services of the Federal soldiers and sailors in the contest just closed by meeting promptly and fully all their just and rightful claims for the services they have rendered the nation, and by extending to those of them who have fallen the most generous and considerate care.
