SENATOR CONKLING, in his brief explanation and disclaimer of the reported interview between himself and a Herald reporter, has dampened a good deal of Democratic powder and caused many a fizzle on the part of heavily-loaded blunderbusses.

Gold and Silver Coin. The single standard men from Boston, New York and Philadelphia, who arrived here yesterday to enter their protest against the silver bill now before the Senate, would have exerted a much more salutary influence upon the business interests of the country if they had stayed at home.
