MONETARY MATTERS. FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL NEWS.

Wall Street Transactions-The Latest Quotation in Stocks and Bonds-New York and Baltimore Produce Markets-London and Paris Money Markets.

The following observations on the transactions in the financial market yesterday, together with highest, lowest, and closing stock quotations, are furnished by the banking-house of H. D. Cooke, jr., & Co., 1492 F street, Washington, D. C.: The market has been exceedingly dull and loactive,

it at many times being difficult to execute large trades. A little after noon it was announced that the Secretary of the Treasury had purchased 5,000,000 sixes. This feature tended to boom prices a little, making them reach the highest figure of the day. Market closes irregular, half the list having an advance of from to 21/2 per cent., one-fourth of the list closing where y opened, the other one-fourth suffering a decline of from 1/2 to 1/2 per cent. The market has been void of outside pressure, and most everything has seemed to hang upon the decision of the Secretary of the Treasury in regard to the national banks. It would eem as if the public were laying uncalled-for importance upon the decision in this matter. Speculators may make use of it to influence the market for the moment; but whether the decision is favorable to the banks or not, the money will soon find its way back to the market if desired by the banks. In the one instance the bonds will be redeposited by the banks who have taken them up and the legal tenders will be returned to them; and, on the other hand, if the cretary decides this cannot be done under the law, the banks may deposit their bonds and have new circulation of their own banks issued to them. In some few instances the banks may have to wait until new notes are printed bearing their names; but, as the Comptroller of the Currency has some \$80,000,000 of notes of the different national banks on hand, it is to be supposed that a portion of the demand can be supplied at once should it be called for by the banks It has been remarked in former letters that the ompilations of prices of railroad earnings show a marked falling off, which would lead prudent men to ask the question whether some stocks were not selling above their intrinsic worth.
