## TO REFUND MONEY TO MANY FARMERS

Vehicle Licenses Illegally Paid Will Be Refunded at Controller's Office.

MUCH KICK REGISTERED.

FARMERS CLAIMED THAT THEY WERE BEING TREATED UNFAIR-LY BY CITY-BOYCOTT THREAT.

A sum of \$125 was appropriated by the city council at its meeting last night, to refund license fees paid for vehicle licenses by farmers. City Controller, E. G. McMahan went over the books carefully, yesterday afternoon, to determine the amount of money necessary to repay the farmers, and he believes that \$125 will be sufficient for this purpose.
