

## TEXAS WILSON MEN HOLD A CONFERENCE

Hope to Elect Forty Delegates for Him from the Lone Star State.

(National News Association)

AUSTIN, Texas, March 1.—Political interest in Texas is centered in a conference which is to be held at Waco tomorrow by friends of Woodrow Wilson, who expect at that time to lay the foundation for an aggressive fight to elect forty delegates to the Democratic national convention who will be in favor of the nomination of the New Jersey governor for President. The Wilson partisans in the Lone Star State appear confident of capturing the entire delegation, but feel they should wage an aggressive fight as if they regarded the result in doubt. As the result of the Waco meeting it is expected that a vigorous campaign for a Wilson delegation to Baltimore will be maintained up to the time of the holding of the State convention or the State primaries, if the last-named system of selecting the delegates is adopted by the State executive committee. There appears to be a popular demand for the holding of a presidential preference primary and in connection with the Waco conference tomorrow there will be a separate meeting of Democratic leaders from various parts of the state to consider the matter.

Discussing the political situation in Texas, with respect to the chances of Woodrow Wilson securing the support of the Texas delegation, Judge Cato Sells of Cleveland, who is chairman of the executive committee of the Woodrow Wilson State Democratic League, says not only optimistic, but our confidence in the situation is justified by reports, coming through a systematic organization in practically every county in the State, which indicate that at least three-fourths of the Democrats of Texas are in favor of the candidacy of Governor Wilson, and that Texas will send a solid Woodrow Wilson delegation to the Baltimore convention.

## COFFEE BERRIES.

Round Kernels Are Stronger and Richer Than Flat Ones.

Everybody is more or less familiar with the term "male berry" applied to coffee. The term refers to the form and style, not the sex.

An examination of any kind of coffee will show that about one kernel in every twenty-five is quite round, like a bean, while all the others are flat on one side, like the half of a split bean. These round or male berries are always found on the young, vigorous, new wood of the previous year's growth at the end of the branches.

The old wood produces flat berries only. Each "pod" or fruit of the coffee tree contains either two common flat berries or but one round one. The substance of the fruit in the one case all goes into the single male berry, and in the other it is divided among two flat ones.

This undoubtedly accounts for the greater strength and richness of the male berry. In private plantations, where the trees are carefully pruned and cared for and the ground well cultivated and fertilized, the coffee is always of finer quality and the proportion of male berries is larger.

The round berries may be seen in all kinds of coffee. Rio, Ceylon, Maracabo, Mocha and other varieties contain them as well as the Java.—Exchange.

## CALIFORNIA'S BIG TREES.

They Were First Seen by a White Man, John Bidwell, in 1841.

It was on June 20, 1841, that John Bidwell discovered the "big trees" of California. He was the first white man, so far as we know, who ever beheld those monarchs of the forest.

Nine years later a hunter named Dowd was led into the company of the forest kings by a bear that he was chasing, and it was by Dowd that the knowledge of the monster trees was spread abroad, but to Bidwell belongs the distinction of having been the first civilized man to gaze upon the wonderful trees.

The "big trees," as the mighty sequoia are called, are found in Calaveras county, Cal., chiefly in two "groves," the Calaveras and the Mariposa, at an altitude of about 5,000 feet above the sea. They are probably the remains of extensive woods belonging to a long past epoch. Unfortunately few of them are left, there being only a few hundred left told.

These mighty conifers are easily the most remarkable of all trees both in size and in bulk. They are from 200 to 400 feet in height and from 15 to 40 feet in diameter.—Louisville Herald.

**Chinese Complexions.**  
A French writer has given in La Presse Medicale the results of his observations on massage in China. He remarks that the exquisite complexion of the young Chinese women is due not to enameling, as has been suspected, but to careful manipulation of the face done by expert masseuses. They begin by a gentle pinching of the cheeks between the tips of their fingers, which lasts fully ten minutes, then apply lotions on absorbent cotton, then an unguent, and finish by kneading the cheeks with an extreme delicacy of touch, always proceeding from the nose and commissures of the lips toward the ears. This is a harmless and physiologically correct process which can be recommended in cases, rarer than they should be, where the physician is consulted concerning a faded or otherwise unattractive complexion.

**Where Israel "Murmured."**

## PROGRESSIVES ARE TO OPEN CAMPAIGN

National Leaders in Movement Are to Speak at Boston Mass Meeting.

BOSTON, Mass., March 1.—The opening gun in the campaign to swing Massachusetts into the Progressive Republican column at the election next fall will be fired tomorrow night. The local committee of the organization has completed arrangements for a mass meeting to be held at that time in Tremont Temple, with Senator Moses E. Clapp of New Jersey as the head-line speaker. The personnel of the speakers' list is taken to indicate that the affair is to be a Roosevelt demonstration, though the promoters of the meeting declare that its sole object is to boom the Progressive cause in this state, without regard to any individual candidate.

The political situation in Massachusetts this year is regarded as peculiar, and unless all signs go astray the Old Bay state, for many years looked upon as a stronghold of the Republican, will be as well worth looking after the G. O. P. managers as some of the other states that have been known in the past as "doubtful."

Encouraged by the re-election of Governor Foss last fall the Progressive Republicans propose to see what they can do to prevent a solid delegation being sent to the Chicago convention for President Taft. The Progressives say that Governor Foss' re-election proves two things, first that there is a strong Progressive element in the state which is willing to support a Progressive candidate, and secondly that a great many Republicans are dissatisfied with President Taft and his administration and took the only means in their power to show their disapproval by voting for the Democratic candidate for governor.

The President's championing of reciprocity, say the Progressives, was resented by the farmers, who voted for Governor Foss, not because he was opposed to reciprocity, but to show their disapproval of the President's action. Business men, they also say, voted against the Republican candidate for governor as a rebuke to the President for prosecuting the trusts.

At the same time, it is apparent that President Taft still has many warm and faithful friends in Massachusetts and the old-line party leaders express confidence in their ability to keep the state in line for the President's re-nomination and re-election. One of the stumbling blocks in the way of smooth sledding for the Roosevelt boom here is the attitude of Senator Henry Cabot Lodge, for many years past the acknowledged leader of the Republicans of Massachusetts. Senator Lodge, though a college mate and life-long personal friend of Colonel Roosevelt, is unalterably opposed to some of the latter's policies, particularly his support of the judicial recall, and it is not believed the Senator can be prevailed upon to support the movement for Roosevelt's nomination.

## EXTEND SOVEREIGNTY

Chinese Republic Wants to Cover Manchuria.

NANKING, March 1.—The Republic government is preparing a proclamation which will shortly be issued giving notice of the expression of the republic's sovereignty to cover Manchuria.
