It was not mad, stated the officers, merely lonesome and playful. School was finally resumed.

A PIKE IMPROVEMENT

Is Petitioned for by Several Ministers.

Between forty and fifty residents of the south side, including the Revs. F. A. Roell, of the St. Andrew's Catholic church; Conrad Huber, of the St. Paul's Lutheran church; F. A. Feeger, of the St. John's Lutheran church; E. G. Howard of the First English Lutheran church, and Joseph Beck of the Trinity Lutheran church, appeared before the board of county commissioners this afternoon and requested that a petition for the improvement of the Liberty Pike be granted and viewers appointed.

The petitions which were filed with the county auditor, February 14, were presented by Attorney Henry U. Johnson. As far as is known there is no opposition to the petition which requests that the pike be improved by grading and sloping and paving with macadam from South L street to below the Catholic and Lutheran cemeteries, one and one-half miles south. The petitions also ask that curbing and gutters be constructed on each side of the roadway, which will be thirty feet in width.

Three petitions were circulated on the proposed improvement and 699 signatures were attached to them. The cost of the improvement is not known. The board of commissioners also received the petition for a bridge on the road running from a point on the National road, east of the city near the Sycamore School House, to the New Paris pike. Petitioners declared that in rainy weather it is almost an impossibility to ford the stream which runs across the road.

The petition for the opening of a roadway in Spring Grove was also presented to the commissioners.

JOHNSON IS CAUSTIC

In Making an Argument Before Jury Today.

The jury in the case of Frank Morgan versus the Citizens' Telephone company of Cambridge City which has occupied the time of the Wayne circuit court for the past ten days, received the case shortly after noon today. Henry U. Johnson, leading counsel for the plaintiff, concluded his arguments about 12 o'clock. Up to a late hour this afternoon the jury was still out.

In his final arguments to the jury Attorney Johnson made several caustic statements in reply to arguments of Attorney John F. Robbins for the defendant. Attorney Johnson declared that in his twenty-five years of practice as a member of the Wayne county bar he had known of but one damage case in which the plaintiff had died as a result of his injuries. He declared that in the case referred to Attorney Robbins had represented the plaintiff.

Morgan is asking for \$20,000 damages for personal injuries which he alleges he sustained while driving south on Johns street in Cambridge City. The complaint alleges that his body came in contact with a sagging wire of the defendant company and that he was severely injured, being unable to stand erect now.

ASK CLEMENCY FOR QUADRUPLE SLAYER

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., March 6.—A movement is under way to obtain a commutation of sentence in the case of Hex Pasco, the murderer of the Hubbell family, who is to be executed this month. Pasco's crime was one of the most atrocious in the criminal records of Missouri. His victims were Odell Hubbell and his wife and two children, who were found murdered in their home in Nodaway County on November 20, 1910. Suspicion pointed toward Pasco, who had served a prison term for one murder. Bloodhounds followed the trail to his home, where he was found hiding. A bloody shotgun was found on the Pasco premises and the shoes of the suspected man fitted the tracks around the Hubbell home. He was tried at Maryville a year ago and found guilty. According to the evidence at the trial, a poker game in which Pasco lost heavily and Hubbell furnished the motive for the quadruple killing.

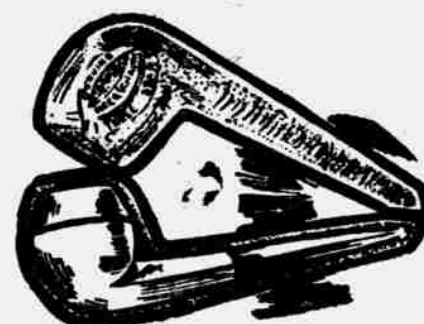

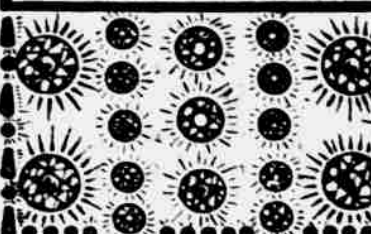
