# WAR COST TO BELLIGERENTS **WAS 175 BILLION**

Peak of War Expenditures is Not Yet Reached in United States.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. .7 .- In ound numbers the war indebtedness of all belligerents on both sides in the world war totals something like \$175,-000,000,000, according to the estimate of the federal reserve board.

The borrowing of such an enormous quantity of money, the board declares, has been accomplished by "inflation," that is to say by a general advance

in prices.
With the resumption of peace conditions that inflation will have to be taken out of both commodities and wages. The deflation, however, can scarcely occur to any great extent in


