## SUGGESTS R. R. MAN IN CABINET

(International News Service.)  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 9.—Much of the powerful authority over American railroads, now exercised by the director-general, would be placed in the hands of a new cabinet officer, "the secretary of transportation," in a plan outlined today by T. DeWitt Cusler, chairman of the Association of Railway Executives, to the senate committee on interstate commerce. This proposal, approved, he said, by many of the leading railroad men of the country, provides for the continuation "as a matter of national policy of private ownership, management and operation of the roads."  
Not only would normal transportation be conducted under drastic regulations of the proposed department of transportation, but in time of national emergency it is recommended that the railroads would be operated as "a unified national system," practically as at present.  
"The interstate commerce commission should act as a quasi-judicial body to pass on questions of rates and discrimination," asserted Mr. Cusler.
