SHEET AND TIN PLATE MILLS IN EAST ACTIVE

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—Indications for the past seven weeks would seem to show that the iron and steel industry has passed the low point and now on the mend. The American Sheet & Tin Plate Company has announced advances in prices for sheet and tin plate of from 1 to 2 1/2 cents a ton, effective Sept. 12. A number of independent mills have already done the same and the rate is expected to follow suit shortly.

During the week sheet and tin plate mills throughout the country increased their operating schedules to almost 80 per cent of capacity. The United States Steel Corporation's mills were operating at approximately 80 per cent of capacity and independent mills were just about reaching this rate at the end of the week. Only three weeks ago the sheet and tin plate mills were operating at only 25 per cent of normal and those of the independents still less. The American Sheet & Tin Plate Co. reports that the amount of business taken in August was the best at any month since February and 45 per cent greater than July.

The iron furnaces of the country produced 844,192 tons of pig iron against 844,555 tons in July, and as compared to 817,492 tons in August of last year.
