Alma Robilla, the soprano of the Kruger Concert company, which appears at the New Phillips Theater Friday evening, October 28th, is a gold medalist and graduate of the Cincinnati College of Music and has had the advantage of a year of study under the celebrated teacher of singing, Shakespeare of London, who was the teacher of David Bispham, who recently sang in this city, and she also studied for several years under the celebrated Madame Marchesi, of Paris. She has also had the advantage of several years residence in Europe, during which time she did a great deal of concert work all over Great Britain, having sung with great success before Queen Alexandra of England, who personally congratulated her for "her beautiful

voice and artistic singing." Just before returning to this country she sang a number of times at the Glasgow exposition in concerts in conjunction with Mark Hamburg, the celebrated young pianist who is rapidly coming to the front. Whilst studying with Madame Marchesi in Paris, Sir Arthur Sullivan, the composer of Pinafore and other popular comic operas, heard her sing and requested an introduction, and stated to her that when she had finished her studies he would be glad to do what he could for her in Great Britain, but his early death put an end to this. She is blessed with an extraordinary memory, having an extensive repertory of between 400 and 500 of the best German lieder, French, Italian and English songs, all of which are sung from memory.

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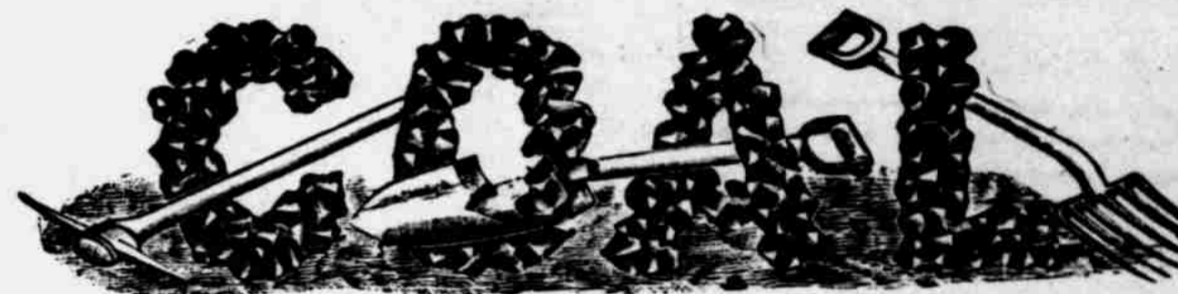
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SOCIETY NEWS
