Refuges Arrive at Naples.

Naples, Dec. 30 .- The appalling magnitude of the tragedy in the south of Italy is being brought home to the people of the north by the arrival here of 800 refugees wounded and unscatched by steamer from Messina. The face that dying people have to be brought such a distance for medical attention shows the immensity of the disaster and the inadequacy of the relief measures at the present possible. The condition of the wounded is pitiable, a few of them have had heads and limbs bandaged, but many have not yet received medical attention. It is expected that by tomorrow night fully 50,000 injured persons will have made their way to this city.
