# Ready For Tussle

## HEALTHY BANGS TAKE 3 IN ROW

SPEED FAMILY HIT LIKE FIENDS  
AND TOOK ADVANTAGE OF  
LOOPHOLES IN DEFENSE.

## 9 TO 5 WAS THE END

Brightest Spot in the Play of the Victims Was Contributed by Midget Moore, the Giant Short-Stopper.

What had the symptoms of an Indian victory, was converted, via the bang route, into the third Ottumwa win at the Myrtle street parlors of amusement Thursday during the sun period. The Speed family decided in the fifth frame to slam the sizzlers of Silver Sloan, and the said session was replete with healthy raps that netted five scores for the natives. Another seance of bangs added three more in the seventh, and just to show that he is not adverse to four-sack slices, Taylor Kinsel punched the pill over the right field fence in the eighth for the ninth score. Keokuk chased three across in the second on as many hits and a walk and a wild pitch by the comeback kid with the hand, some countenance. Boothby pelted a freak homer in the eighth when his clout to right field hit the ground and obligingly hopped over the barrier. Three more rampaging redskins smote safe in the ninth, and score No. 5 was earned.

There you have all the ingredients of the pleasing mixture in one short paragraph.

The startling feature of the afternoon from a Keokukian slant, was the miraculous fielding of the youthful coverer of the short field, Midget Moore, the Paragould whirlwind. What Moore didn't get failed to come his way, and what he did get was in at least three instances large bunched labeled "poison." The lad grabbed 'em out of the skies, chased back of second to glove a hope, ping broadside from Johnson's stick, and speared a terrific line punch from the pole of Wall. His pegging, too, was perfect, and the only weak spot noticeable in his playing was at the bat. If Moore could hit, he has a job in the high burs reserved for him at some future date.

## Pitchers Work Even.

Plympton and Sloan worked about an even war throughout the afternoon, both being found for ten clouts, but the one getting away a slight bit better with the war club than the other. The hitter of the pair was the third young thing whom Belt bought from the ailing Paragould planet. His first clout in the second chased across a run and his double in the ninth put Belt within range of the plate. Plympton's own spank was by no means ineffective, scoring Wise for the first of the wholesale quantity of runs in the fifth. Leroy had two wild whiff record, but his two wild pitches and walks figured as prominently in Keokuk's runs as Sloan's five passes did in Ottumwa's tallies. It might also be said that Plympton's strike-outs retired the side in two dangerous moments, while Sloan had to depend upon his support to do the needful in the three frames that Ottumwa was bent on scoring. Murray, pinch-hitting for Kinsel in the sixth, was easy for Leroy, who fanned him twice.

## The fateful Innings.

Keokuk's best stanza was the second, which Painter opened with a perfect strike-out. Jensen hit safe and Kinsel walked. Moore skied out to Sleno and Cavanaugh tapped to right, scoring Jensen. Sloan looked like an easy out because of the fact that he is a pitcher, but his rap to right won him the respect of the home parties, and incidentally scored Kinsel and put Cavanaugh on third. In trying to whiff Hilly, which he finally accomplished, Plympton committed a wild pitch and Cavanaugh registered.

Eddie Wise was the gent that found the key to Sloan's befuddling stuff in the opening of the Ottumwa fifth. The Logansport lightning rod agent pushed the ball slowly down to Jensen, who was compelled to grab it and toss it quickly to Painter to get Wise. Jensen reached too quick for the pill and Wise was on the bag before the visiting fielder could grasp the ball securely to peg it. Wise's lead off first pulled a wild toss from Father Belt, who, by the way, relieved Cavanaugh in the fourth when the latter was injured by a foul tip. Eddie scampered to third on the error and remained there while Painter retired Link. Plympton came across with the necessary bingle to right for Wise to register on, and then came the parade.

## Home Runs Numerous.

Kinsel soaked to center and Russell poled to right. Sloan then walked Johnson, forcing Plympton home. Wall's double to left scored Kinsel and Russell, and Sleno's walk again crowded the bags. Gard smote to left for a sack and Johnson's run, and then Wise, who opened the inning, came up the second time. His whack to right found a resting spot in Kinsel's eager paws, and the toss to Painter by Kinsel beat Gard back to the sack for the third out of the frame.

Moore's second brilliant play of the afternoon opened the Ottumwa seventh, with Russell as the victim. The Rabbit's line pole three feet over Moore's head, was grabbed out of the sky when the midget jumped for it.

Cavanaugh was shoved to the hospital in the fourth when he got a tip foul off Wall's bat. Belt then took up active labor behind the cord wood.

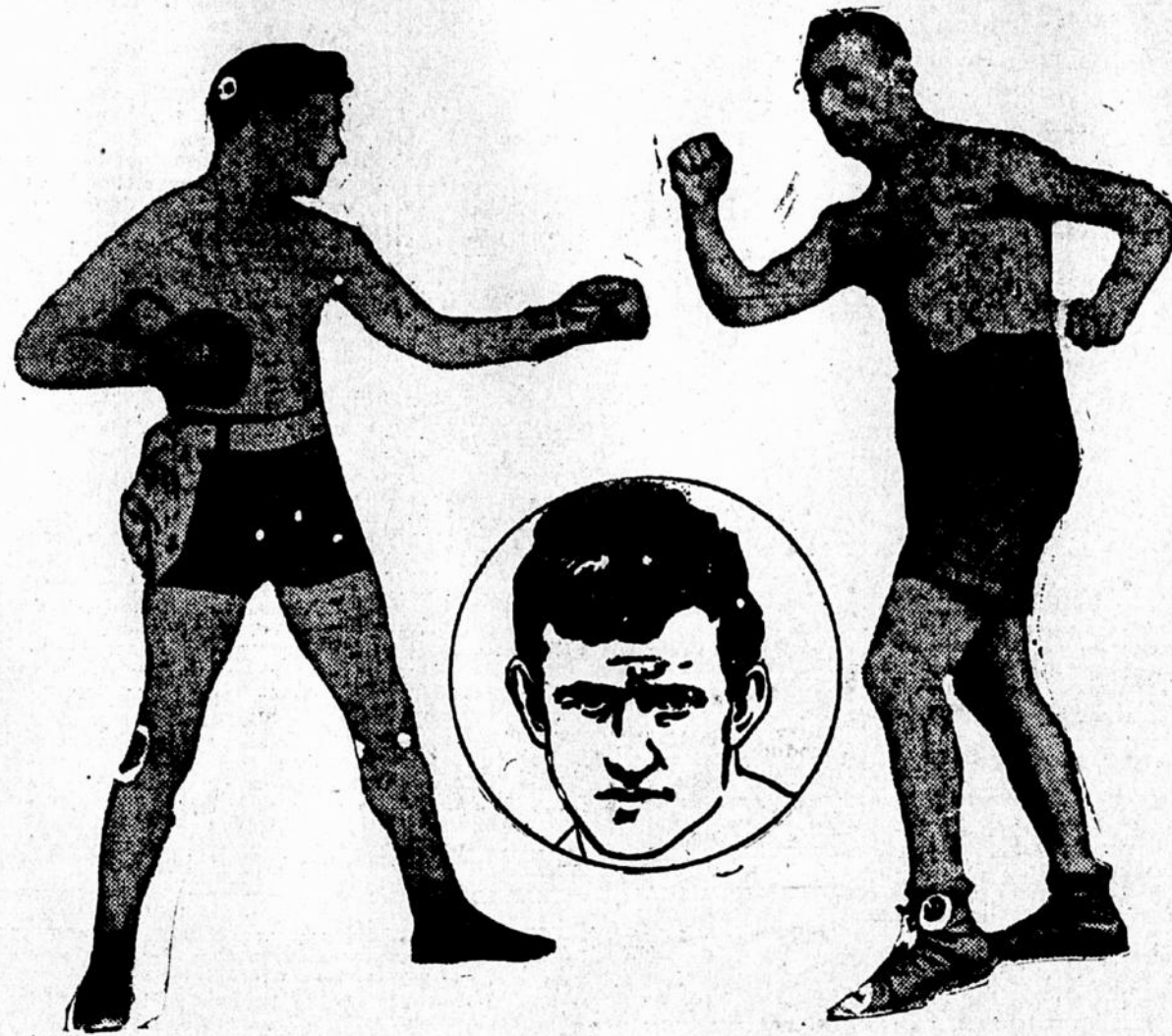
The fifth from a home standpoint was considerable inning. The natives battled around. The side was retired by Kinsel doubling Gard at first after grabbing Wise's difficult fly.
