To Talk Through Telephone.

Scientific tests show that every additional inch of distance between the lips of the speaker and the mouth-piece of the telephone is equivalent to adding 120 miles of wire to the line over which one is talking. The proper distance is about one inch; if farther than that, such sounds as "b, p, d, t, f, k" are transmitted poorly. If closer than one-half inch, nasal sounds like "m" and "n" do not enter the transmitter properly.

That the Chautauqua Festival program for the coming season holds much of interest for the lecture, music and entertainment lovers is indicated by the advance information from the Elison-White Association. The dates for Rockland have been definitely set for Dec. 15-20.

A lecture of paramount importance is scheduled for the fourth night in the coming of J. Franklin Babb, the "Sunshine Speaker." Babb and his great lecture set New England thinking a year or so ago. Myra Reed, assisting artist with Mr. Skibinsky, has a coloratura soprano voice of wonderful beauty and as a pianist her work has been likened to that of the great master, Josef Hoffman.
