### Be Careful Says Canning Expert

#### Miss Amy Kelly Advises Regarding Preparation of Canned Foods—Warns Against Carelessness in Sealing—Tells How to Detect Imprints.

Miss Amy Kelly, head of the home demonstration department of the extension work of the agricultural department of the state university, in a circular issued to all county agents on the danger from spoiled canned foods, calls attention to the fact that there is a decided danger, even death, in canned foods that are not in good condition, and in her circular letter says: "I wish to again call your attention to the care that should be taken in regard to the use of canned vegetables in the home."

"Two years ago, when there was a case of botulinus poisoning in Boise, Idaho, I asked you to urge the public to boil all canned vegetables before serving. Because of the recent case of food poisoning at Cambridge, Idaho, I am again asking you to publish in all your local papers the following from the Farmers' Bulletin No. 1211:

"1. Make it the absolutely invariable rule never to can any vegetable or fruit not in first class condition; that is do not can food which is slightly moldy or specked, oversoft, or 'just ready to spoil,' or partly rotted. Cutting out the soft spots and using the rest for canning may prove very poor economy in the end.  
"2. Give all canned food a careful and rigid inspection at the time the can or jar is opened, and discard any material having an unusual appearance or odor, without even tasting it. It is a precaution to notice the odor of the vegetable while it is boiling for an odor so slight as to be unnoticed while the vegetable mass is could may be quite perceived when intensified by heating.  
"3. Boil the food as it comes from the can before tasting it. In this type of poisoning, fortunately, most bacteriologists believe that it is not necessary to destroy every bacterial spore, but rather the toxin or poison formed by the growth of the bacteria, which is a much easier matter. It must be clearly understood, however, that this does not warrant us in boiling spoiled food and then consuming it.  
"4. The final disposal of canned goods which have spoiled, or are suspected of spoilage, is a matter of real importance. Chickens and other animals have often been fatally poisoned by eating such spoiled materials. Even worse than this danger is the possibility of spreading the bacillus botulinus (or possibly other dangerous spores) through the soil. With such consideration in mind it would seem that infectious material, such as the discharge from a typhoid or tubercular patient or the carcass of an animal which had died of anthrax, that is to say, they should be burned, or, if that is impracticable, they should be boiled for an hour with some efficient disinfectant in order to be sure that all dangerous spores are destroyed. Burying them deeply in the soil with a generous covering of quicklime will prevent the poisoning of domestic animals and may have some influence in preventing infection of the soil with a highly dangerous organism."

### Health Officials Issue Warning

Recommendations concerning the epidemic of the so-called "Flu".

Reports indicate that the peak of the disease has not been reached, as yet, there being an increase in the number of cases reported in the last two days. The Department of Public Welfare has decided that the following rules will be in force:

1. No person showing evidence of the beginning of the disease such as by colds, sneezing, coughing, watery eyes, etc. to be allowed in any public gathering such as schools, churches, theaters, crowded stores, or other gatherings of people.
2. Persons in charge of such public gatherings will be requested to ask such persons to leave the place. School teachers are requested to

send any child home that shows any of the above symptoms and to notify the school nurse who will investigate the case.

Parents are notified that there will be no further placarding of homes from which the disease is reported.

Parents are urged to keep their child at home and in bed if it shows signs of becoming ill. It is much better to take the disease in time and break it up than to allow the child to run loose until the disease is well developed, as this frequently results in complications.

People are also urged to take better care of their health in general; to see that their homes are properly heated and ventilated and otherwise to do everything possible to avoid the lowering of their vitality. In the average case the course of the disease seems to run for a period of two and a half to three or four days. Cases with a high temperature are urged to take a longer time in convalescing before assuming their duties.

Physicians are requested to report each day to the County Health Officer, and also to the Department of Public Welfare, the number of new cases. It is advisable to isolate the person ill at home from the rest of the family as much as possible and thus avoid any unnecessary exposure. This is an excellent time to commence the practice of good health laws.

### Nitrates From Explosives.

A plant has been established near Turin, Italy, for the transformation of explosives into nitrates for agricultural uses. These explosives are to be gathered from the battlefields to the value of 1,000,000 lire, and their products combined with other materials for the production of fertilizers. The factory now employs 250 men and is expected to produce 30,000 quintals of fertilizers, containing 15 per cent azote, within a short time, according to a report of Consul Dana C. Sycks.
