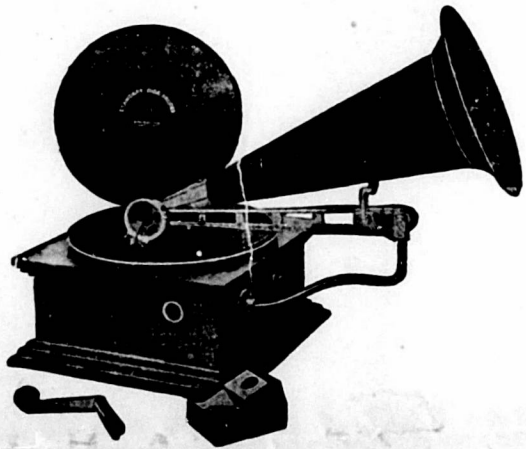

GOOD TEST FOR NICOTINE.

Experiments That May Be of Interest to Smokers.

"Anyone who wishes to find out how much nicotine he might take into his system by smoking can easily get an idea by a very simple experiment," says an old smoker, who is rarely seen in public or private without a cigar in his mouth. "Puff briskly until the cigar smoke is clear white then draw a big mouthful, double your handkerchief, place it over your lips and blow out the smoke violently as though you were whistling. D. 1907, that the following described Sanitary Sewer District has been established and shall be known as Sanitary Sewer District No. 8, of the Town of Delta, Colorado, to-wit: All of Block Numbered Six of the original plat of the Town of Delta, Colorado, in said County of Delta and State of Colorado; that in said Sanitary Sewer District, No. 8 a district sanitary sewer shall be constructed as follows: to-wit: Said sewer line shall be connected with the present sanitary sewer at the South side of Block Numbered Five of the original plat of said town, and run thence south through the center of the alley between the east and west halves of said Block Six to a point on the south line of Seventh Street and shall be seven feet deep at its terminus. By the side of said sewer line and six inches deeper shall be laid a line of drain tile six inches in diameter, with the ends well butted together. The sewer line shall be of vitrified sewer pipe six inches in diameter with the ends cemented together with a Ideal Portland cement, and both lines laid on a uniform grade so that a lighted candle can be seen through any stretch of 50 feet of said sewer pipe. The drain tile line shall be covered over with gravel at least two inches in depth. The sewer at present located in the alley at the south line of said Block Five, shall be removed and placed in the alley at the south line of Seventh Street.

The probable cost per foot, as shown by the estimates of the Town Engineer is 70 cents per foot for each linear foot of said sewer and drain tile. The Town of Delta shall pay the entire cost of said sewer line and drain across Sixth and Seventh Streets. The cost of constructing said sewer and drain tile line shall be payable in cash, in one installment, within thirty days after the completion of said sewer line and its acceptance by the Board of Trustees of said town; and unless so paid, shall thereafter bear interest at 1 per cent per month until paid.

You are further notified that on December 16th, A. D. 1907, at 8 o'clock P. M., the Board of Trustees of said Town at a regular meeting, will finally consider an ordinance ordering the said public improvements to be constructed in said sewer district; that the map of said district, prepared by said Town Engineer, together with the estimate and schedule of said Town Engineer, showing the amounts to be assessed against each and every tract of land in said sewer district, and all resolutions and proceedings are on file with and can be seen and examined by any person interested at the office of the Town Clerk in the said Town of Delta, Colorado at any time between the date of publication of this notice and December 16th, A. D. 1907 at 8 o'clock P. M. and that all complaints and objections that may be made in writing, presented to said Town Clerk, by the owner or owners of any real estate in said sewer district concerning the proposed public improvements will be heard and determined by the Board of Trustees of said town before final action by said Board of Trustees ordering such district sanitary sewer.

NOTICE—CONTRACT TO LET FOR ROAD CONSTRUCTION.

Bids will be received at the office of David Anderson, Colbran, Colo., on or before November 25, 1907 for the construction of a wagon road four and one half miles, more or less in length, beginning at a point two miles west of the S. E. Cor. of T. 12, S. R. 91, W. 6th, P. M., on the South line of The Battlement Mesa National Forest and running thence in a N. W. direction up Hubbard Creek to a point known as the Wade Ranch. Each bid for the construction of said road must be accompanied by a bond in the sum of \$50.00 guaranteeing the applicants ability to perform the conditions of the contract. The road to be not less than eight feet wide at any point and sixteen feet wide at all points necessary for turnouts. There will be several small bridges to be built of logs and poles, the material for which will be furnished free of charge by The Forest Service but not delivered on the ground. It will be necessary for the road to follow the bed of the creek for a considerable distance, all of which must be well riprapped, no riprapping or bridges to be less than two feet above high water mark. All outcrops for bridges must be solid and deep enough to insure against wash-outs. The successful bidder will be allowed until July 1, 1908 to complete the road. Prospective bidders may apply to William W. Borom, Deputy Forest Ranger, Battlement Mesa, Colo., for exact specifications and to be shown over the proposed route.
