The state sanitary board has been communicated with and H. M. Bracken, secretary of the state board of health, has directed that the animals be dispatched if it is found that they are afflicted with glanders.

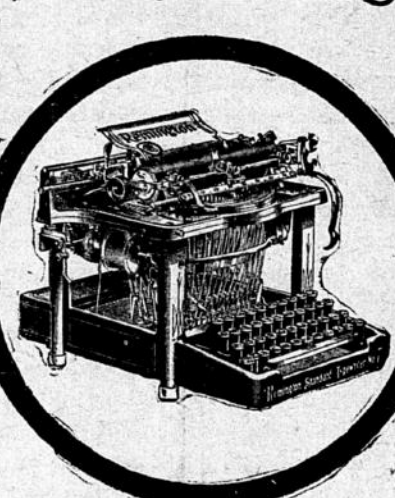
