


Board reconvened per adjournment, with the following members present: Commissioners Olson, Wagner, Saxerud and Gunderson.

In the absence of Chairman Danaher, Vice Chairman Saxerud took the chair.

Three bids on the construction of the town line road between the towns of Maple Ridge and Liberty were submitted to the board, and on motion duly made, seconded and carried, the bid of David LaFevre for the construction

of the road, as follows: Beginning at the west one-sixteenth stake of section thirty-five, town of Maple Ridge, and running there due cast a distance of one and three-fourths miles to the southeast corner of section thirty-six of said town,—was accepted at \$450.00 for the clearing of said highway; and at the rate of \$2.25 per lineal rod for the corduroying; he to furnish the proper bond and contract.
