PASS PRACTICE CALLED MENACE

Interstate Commission So
Reports to Senate.

FIGURES ON TWO ROADS

Investigation of Big Southern Carriers Shows That Judges, Legislators and Other State and Federal Officials Have Free Transportation.

Washington, July 10.—Characterizing the distribution of free transportation by railroads as "a menace to the institutions of a free people," the interstate commerce commission reported to the senate the results of its investigations, directed against the Louisville and Nashville and the Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis roads.

The report says that during 1913 the two roads distributed passes representing more than 11,000,000 miles of travel, valued at \$340,260.61, to more than 34,000 individuals in every walk of life.

The Louisville and Nashville gave passes to: United States senators, 1; representatives, 2; other United States officials, 139; state senators, 1,556; state representatives, 2,183; other state officials, 1,769; judges, 89.

Judges Get Many.
The Nashville, Chattanooga and St. Louis gave to United States officials, other than members of congress, 151; state senators, 5,814; state representatives, 8,439; other state officials, 1,086; judges, 170.

The commission informed the senate that although it could issue no order in the special investigation pursued under the resolution it was making a general investigation in which it intends to issue an order dealing with the practice. The commission said:

"These citizens, who sell their influence quite as much as if they accepted money bribes, seem to be as willing to be tied as the carriers are ready to tie them. Men pledge their influence quietly in the home, or school or club, in the professions, in business, in city councils and administrative boards, in courts of justice, in executive halls and at the polls."

WARBURG MAY SERVE ON FEDERAL BOARD

To Accept Place If Exempted
From Senate Committee Quiz.

Washington, July 10.—Paul Warburg, the New York banker, has reconsidered his request that President Wilson withdraw his nomination as a member of the federal reserve board on the condition that he will not consent to appear before the senate banking committee to be cross-examined.

After receipt of a telegram from Mr. Warburg it was said by officials close to the president that an active fight would be made for the confirmation. It was declared that should the banking committee fail to report the nomination favorably the president expects the senate to act as a whole.

The situation as to the nomination of Thomas D. Jones of Chicago remains unchanged. It was said the president would continue to press for his confirmation.

BURNQUIST SPURNS OFFER
Will Not Act as "Restricted" Governor of Minnesota.

St. Paul, July 10.—Governor Eberhart has abdicated and authorized Lieutenant Governor Burnquist to assume the duties of governor until he returns from his lecture tour Sept. 1. But in his telegram to the lieutenant governor the executive qualified his delegation of power by restricting it to pardon and regulation matters.

According to Attorney General Smith the governor cannot restrict the duties of the lieutenant governor acting for him at his request in this matter and as a result Mr. Burnquist will not assume the office at this time.

IN FAVOR OF DRY NATION
Iowa Bull Moosers Adopt Prohibition Plank.

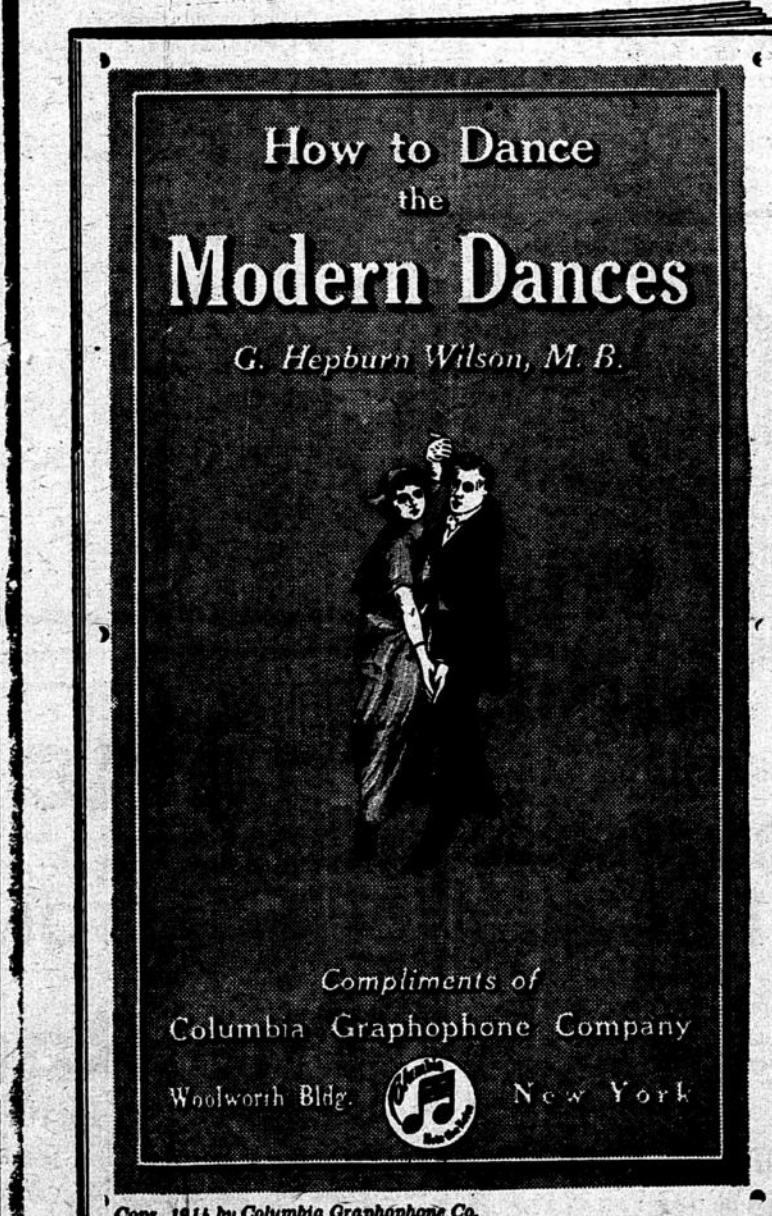
Des Moines, July 10.—The Progressive party in Iowa is "dry." After a fight which raged for hours in the resolutions committee and later in the convention proper the delegates went on record by a vote of 358 to 283 in favor of the following plank:
"We believe that the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquor for a beverage is a social and economic evil. Therefore, believing in the rule of the people, we favor the submission of an amendment to our state and national constitutions prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage."

MACHINERY BREAKS AT SEA
Allan Line Steamer Sicilian Turns Back to Queenstown.

Queenstown, July 10.—The Allan line steamer Sicilian's machinery broke down when she was two days out from Havre, whence she sailed on July 3 for Montreal, and she has been forced to put back to this port. She has 250 passengers who are to be transferred to another Allan liner on the arrival of the Sicilian here.
