

VOLUNTEERS ARE WANTED TO HELP RECRUIT MEN FOR SERVICE; URGENT

Patriotic Citizens Start Move to Aid Recruiting Office Continue Its Splendid Work.

AT LEAST \$50 PER MONTH NEEDED FOR INCIDENTALS

Thirty Have Pledged Dollar Per Month; Will You Be One of the Other Twenty?

WANTED—Twenty more men to agree to contribute \$1 a month to the recruiting fund. Thirty have already promised to do this. Fifty are wanted all told. Will you be one of the fifty? If so, step into the Northern National Bank and ask to sign such a petition.

As the work of recruiting in this section of the state progresses, it is apparent that most of the volunteers must be secured from outlying districts, tributary to Bemidji. This costs money. The government does not provide for the defraying of traveling expenses for recruiting officers. This must be paid by local patriotic citizens.

The above "want ad" is a direct appeal to those who wish to do their "bit" in this most important work. Every man sent today is worth ten sent tomorrow. The army needs volunteers now. It may not be so necessary after the large draft army has been drilled into active service.

Yost Urges Speed.

A telegram received from Major John D. Yost, head of the recruiting work in the state of Minnesota, reads as follows:

"E. H. Denu, chairman army recruiting committee: Latest European news shows extraordinary recruiting activity neces-

sary. Make strongest possible effort immediately.

This message is no doubt being sent out all over the United States. Every community is urged to do its utmost. Those eligible for service and not within the draft age should not hesitate a moment to answer this urgent appeal. Bemidji has led in recruiting in the state of Minnesota for three successive months. If it wishes to continue to hold this record some unusual activity in this branch of the service is necessary.
