# ALLEGED DESERTER

Herron was wearing the uniform of, a first lieutenant at the time of his arrest and is alleged to have a number of allases and to have cashed bogus checks in the various cities he has visited amounting to approximately \$2,000.

When he was brought to the office of the department of justice he confessed and told of the wonderful way he had been entertained if cities he had visited among them being New
