### FRENCH HAD 100-MILE GUN

Chief Engineer of Navy Had Cannon Ready at Time of Armistice Signing.

Paris.—While giving evidence before a committee of the chamber of deputies investigating the Briev question M. L. Bourgeois, chief engineer of the navy department, said that at the time Paris was being bombarded by German long-range guns he had designed a cannon with a range of 100 miles, which could be put in position in an hour.

M. Bourgeois stated that before that time he had urged upon Albert Thomas, then undersecretary of state for war and munitions, the importance of bombarding the Briey iron works and had been asked to design a long-range can-

His plans, however, were sent from one committee to another and the order to manufacture it was not given until February, 1918. The gun\_was ready for action at the time the armistice was signed, he said.

### BACK FROM WAR, WIFE GONE

Hence Lieut. James G. Payne Brings Action for Divorce in New York.

New York—Returning from long service in submarine infested waters on March 27, 1918, James G. Payne, who was a lieutenant aboard the cruiser Denver, doing convoy duty, hurried to his home at West 127th St. to greet his wife and their children. He found his old apartment deserted and upon making inquiries of the neighbors discovered his wife had moved with the children. She sent word she wouldn't live with him any longer.

Mr. Payne, who now has an electrical business at 542 Fifth avenue, has begun an action for a separation, and in his complaint, filed in the supreme court, told of how his wife, Oenia C. Payne, had moved during his absence. He said Mrs. Payne had taken all the household effects, including his own belongings.



## Meats in Storage Not "Hoarded"

Live stock is a seasonal crop—like cereals and grains.


