The City Council of the City of Bemidji do ordain:
Section 1. That Section 6 of General Ordinance No. 45 be, and the same hereby is, amended as follows:
For the benefits derived from fire protection by all tax payers in the city, the city shall pay from the General Fund into the Water Fund the sum of Seventy-five (\$75.00) dollars per year for each fire hydrant in service. At the beginning of each quarter the Water Clerk shall make out a bill to the city for one-fourth of the total amount of the hydrant rentals as based on the number of hydrants then in service, and the city clerk shall issue his warrant on the treasurer in the same manner as the payment of ail other bills, which warrant shall be credited to the Water Fund by the Clerk of the Water Works Board the same as cash received. Hydrant rentals shall be payable quarterly in advance.

Section 2. This Ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication.
