**Smashes**

Boggs at Nassau hospital said only three of the plane's motors were working when it took off, and as the plane reached an altitude of 20 feet another of its motors stopped. He attempted to make a landing in a small field, but was unable to REAL ESTATE TRANSFER

When the plane crashed, Boggs and MacDonald were tossed out. Both managed to crawl far enough away to escape the fire that followed. Boggs suffered sprains of both ankles and severe lacerations, and MacDonald a sprained ankle and slight cuts on the face.
