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**Reynosa Planning Many Improvements**  
(Special to The Herald)

McALLEN, Oct. 11.—Machinery and equipment for the installation of a modern water system in Reynosa are expected at any time in that city, according to A. Dominguez, who was in McAllen this week.

It is expected that water will be turned on within 100 days after work begins, he said.

Dominguez is manager of the Water Supply Company of Reynosa, Tamulipas, the organization which is investing a large sum of money for the development of the Mexican border city of Reynosa. The project has been under way for many months and more recently the company has been waging an educational campaign to acquaint the people of the little city with the dangers of using water from their present supply and to show them the developments which will follow the installation of a pure water supply.

The order for the water works was placed some time ago, Dominguez said.

Other improvements are planned for Reynosa. Street paving will be started under Mexican government supervision about May 1937, on all the principal streets of the city. Residential construction has been revived and reports are that three or four modern homes have been completed in recent weeks.

Dominguez further stated that officials of Reynosa are awaiting the completion of the Monterrey-Reynosa road work before opening an intensive campaign of publicity for that city. The road is to be completed about the end of this year, he said.

**AIR VICTIMS LAID TO REST**

Forty-Eight Flag-Draped Caskets Lowered in One Vast Grave

CARDINGTON, Eng., Oct. 11.—(AP)—Earthbound in one vast grave, the 48 victims of the R-101 disaster tonight sleep in the comradeship of death.

One by one their flag-draped coffins were carried down the broad slope of the grave late this afternoon and left within the flower-lined cavern, almost in the shadows of the tall mooring mast whence their doomed airship sailed a week ago tonight.

There were agonizing scenes at the graveside. Several, overcome by grief, fainted and were carried away. While the coffins were being lowered many persons wept and knelt in prayer.

In four rows of 12 caskets each the scant remains of the airman who perished on a hillside in France were laid in their final resting place. After the stately services at St. Paul's Cathedral and the magnificence of the lying in state at Westminster Hall, there was renewed heart appeal in the simplicity of the burial rites at the little village church, standing near the cottages of the men who perished.

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At the close of the brief services, conducted by the Rev. W. Secombe, vicar of Cardington, and other clergymen, three volleys were fired over the grave and the trumpeters sounded "last post." The British equivalent of the American "taps." As the last notes died out the bugles shrilled the notes of "reveille," as is customary in a British military funeral.

A bishop sprinkled a handful of brown earth in the large grave, and the men who died on the largest airship in the world were at rest.
