Over 13,770 Meals Given Brownsville Poor During 1930

Over 13,770 meals were given poor persons during 1930 by the Brownsville chapter of the Volunteers of America, it was reported Saturday. During the past year almost 5,000 them averaging three meals a day, and spending two nights at the

In the annual report issued Saturday it was pointed out that 1930 was a banner year for the organi-zation, having lodged and fed more persons than ever before. An average of 18 a day was maintained from August to December, inclusive, the average for the first seven months of the year being approxi-

mately 9 persons.

"We have had people from New York, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Detroit, Indianapolis, Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City, Los Angeles, and practically all other large cities. No the we have had them from every state in the union during the past five months," it was said. Over 300 persons were fed Christ-

mas day, a special fund having been raised for this charitable work. The past five months has shown a larger number of impoverished transients than the previous seven months, there being 2,700 persons in August, September, October, No-vember and December as compared

The majority of the persons taken care of by the Volunteers of America have been in need of clothing. especially shoes.




