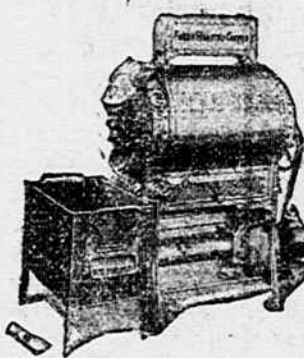

## BANDS OF TEXTILE PLANTS FORM AN ORGANIZATION

First Meeting at Watts Mill a Very Pleasant and Successful One

By invitation 200 band men with several hundred friends, met on the beautiful play grounds of the Watts Mill village. Mr. E. G. Jesse, superintendent of Watts mill, called the meeting to order and introduced Mr. Geo. Wright, president of Watts mill, who made a brief and very happy address of welcome in behalf of the management and people of Watts mill. Mr. Z. F. Wright, president of Newberry Cotton mills was introduced and made the response to the welcome address. Col. J. M. Davis, superintendent of Newberry mills was then called on to state the object of the meeting, which he did, in substance as follows:

That this meeting was called for the single purpose that band men of the different textile plants could meet once a year and become better acquainted; that they get together in closer fellowship. That the organization is not to be a union or to fix what price each man or band should receive for his services, but purely a social organization.

The meeting was then turned over

er to Mr. W. S. Nickerson, director of Watts Mill band, who formed a large circle of 200 musicians which formed one large band, and under his direction played three snappy selections. Mr. Nickerson, who was the originator of the idea, has spent freely of his time and energy to make this organization a success, and to him is due a large share of the credit for making our first meeting so pleasant.

## FATHER KILLED, SON WOUNDED IN FAMILY QUARREL

William Boyd Dead and Son, John Boyd, Probably Fatally Wounded In Laurens County Shooting

Laurens, Sept. 11.—A fatal family quarrel occurred five miles southwest of Cross Hill, Laurens county, this afternoon, when John Boyd, aged 23, was probably mortally wounded by his father, William Boyd, and in turn the son killed his father, shooting him three times with a pistol. John Boyd, the son, was shot in the abdomen with a heavy charge of shot, according to the Laurens officers who returned from the scene of the tragedy tonight at 7 o'clock. John Boyd is not expected to live through the night, according to attending physicians.

The shooting took place in the public road in front of the Boyd home. Officers state that John Boyd was still conscious when they left the scene at 6 o'clock and that the young man said his father shot first and was attempting to reload his gun when he opened fire on the father. The officers say that one of the Boyd boys stated that the father was punishing some of the smaller children when John Boyd interfered. The elder Boyd then turned his wrath on

the son, got his gun and hunted John into the yard or road for a settlement. Within a few minutes the shooting occurred. It is alleged. The coroner is holding an inquest for William Boyd tonight. He was about 50 years old and had a wife and 12 children. John who is fatally shot being the eldest child. Boyd was a farmer and lived on Cane creek.

## TRUCK CRASHES THROUGH BRIDGE; 18 NEGROES DIE

Homerville, Ga., Sept. 11.—Eighteen negroes who were on their way to a baseball game at Axson, Ga., in Atkinson county, about 20 miles away, lost their lives today when an automobile truck in which they were riding crashed through the bridge over the Satilla river. The driver of the truck was hurled backward with such force as to break his neck. Those in the truck were packed in so closely that they had no chance to escape. Fourteen bodies had been recovered tonight. Only meagre details of the accident have been obtained here, the scene of the accident being nearly 20 miles away. C. A. Campbell, owner of the two and a half-ton truck which he permitted the negroes to use for their

outing, said that there were 22 negroes on board when it left here at 10 o'clock this morning. Reports from the scene of the accident indicate that only four escaped death. The bridge over the Satilla river at the scene of the accident, is a wooden structure and not strong enough to hold the overloaded truck. Jim Gaskins, the driver of the truck, was hurled against a beam of the truck, breaking his neck.
