MAN POWER OF HUNS

GOES DOWN RAPIDLY Washington Learns That Enemy Has Less Than Two Hundred Di-

visons on Western Front

Waishington, Sept. 22.-New evidence of the shortage of man power in the German army has reached Washington from an authoritative source, it was learned today, showing that seven enemy divisions on the Western front had been disbanded entirely for lack of men.

There are now only 195 German divisions on the etire front, according to these reports, and of these there are only 16 that have been engaged in heavy figtig of the present year. The report adds that the trench strength of the Germany army is now entirely inadequate.
