MORRISON OUT TO FIGHT WETS

Throws Powerful Support to Amendment's Retention in Charlotte Speech

CHARLOTTE, Oct. 27.—Cameron Morrison came last night from the retirement of his Sharon township farm to throw his powerful support squarely behind the advocates of retention of the 18th Amendment in the national constitution with an address to an audience that packed the Mecklenburg courthouse.

It was the former senator's first address in advocacy of prohibition since the present assault upon the 18th Amendment began, and it was at the same time by far the most enthusiastic meeting of dries held here, according to the general feeling of the audience.

GUARD CALLED TO HALT WORK OF PICKETERS

Are Sworn in as Deputies to Prevent Food Stuffs Moving to Markets

DES MOINES, Oct. 27.—(UP). Pickets seeking to enforce the national farm strike were cleared from Iowa highways today by deputy sheriffs, recruited from the ranks of the Iowa national guard.

National guard officials emphasized that the 30 men who are patrolling the farm-to-market highways near Glenwood are acting as deputy sheriffs and not as national guardsmen.

The move, they said, had no official authority from Governor Clyde L. Herring. Sheriff William De Moss, who said he was acting under orders of the governor to keep the highways open, deputized the guardsmen last night.

FEDERAL PROGRAM ALREADY UNDER WAY

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27. (UP). President Roosevelt and the agricultural adjustment administration have embarked on a campaign to hammer home to the rebellious farmers of the middle west the steps being taken to give them more money, it was evident yesterday.

Without actual mention of the farm strike, the administration is seeking to paint a picture of vast programs for farm relief and at the same time is rushing into effect long planned relief moves held up by various difficulties.

Report Vast Drop In Wheat Supply

Crop Forecast Less by 270,000,000 Bushels

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27. (UP). A drop of 270,000,000 bushels in the world wheat crop, with the exception of the yield in Russia and China, was forecast last night by the bureau of agricultural economics.

The decrease is offset, it was explained, by an increase in stocks at the beginning of the season, the surplus in four principal exporting countries and supplies afloat on July 1 estimated at 84,000,000 bushels more than on July 1, last year, it was stated.

Unless Russian exports are unexpectedly large, the bureau said, the import demands for the year likely will be sufficient to absorb quotas allotted in the London wheat conference. Russia declined to sign the wheat agreement.

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WILL REVISE ARMS CONTROL PROJECT DRAFT

Further Efforts at Geneva Are Formally Deferred to December 4

By STEWART BROWN GENEVA, Oct. 27.—(UP).—Efforts of the world disarmament conference to achieve agreement were deferred yesterday until December 4 in the interim, the steering committee of the conference will labor on a proposal compromising the divergent views which wrecked the intense effort of recent weeks.

The conference approved the recommendation of its steering committee for adjournment as had been expected. Members of the United States delegation, headed by Norman Davis, while pessimistic, were inclined to feel that the compromise on a comparatively brief recess was the best that could be done at present.

The commission charged the steering committee to draft a revised arms control treaty during the intervening weeks. The new draft, under present plans, will be presented to the conference when it meets in December.

Arthur Henderson, of Great Britain, chairman of the commission, outlined the recommendation of the steering committee, but said that the adjournment should not be considered final abandonment of all international arms limitation efforts.

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

LINDBERGH'S FLY TO PARIS

Flight Early Today Completed With Strictest Secrecy

PARIS, Oct. 27.—(UP).—Unconfirmed reports here today said that Colonel and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh landed at Meulan, on the outskirts of Paris. Meulan is a town of the Seine river, about 15 miles from Paris. The Lindberghs were said to have been met by Dieudonne Costes, French flier, at Meulan, a government seaplane testing station. Costes was understood to have conducted them secretly to the Crillon hotel in Paris.
