tute, Spartanburg, S. C. The student body, when the school opened, consisted of one man who wanted "book larin." But students soon came by the hundreds from many sections of the South. For more than 12 years Dr. Camack busied himself in helping men and women secure better educational advantages.

"The textile institute, which Dr. Camack founded, now has an enrollment of 350 students and many are turned away each year. Dr. R. B. Burgess is its president. The institute is said to be the only boarding school of its kind in the world in which the entire student body consists of persons who are entirely self-supporting through manual labor.

"The institute is a mission school and belongs to and is operated by the board of missions of the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, South. Dr. Camack has served churches in Jonesville, Saluda and Ware Shoals, St. Paul's Second Methodist church, Greenville, S. C.; Grace church, Union, S. C.; St. John's church, Rock Hill, S. C. and Canton.

"On October 8, 1903, Dr. Camack was married to Miss Lottie Blair, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Blair, of Winstonsboro, S. C. They have three children: P. M. Camack, a member of the industrial commission of South Carolina; Miss Mariana Camack, a talented artist and a member of the Marion, S. C., high school faculty, and Miss Blair Camack, a junior at Winthrop college, Rock Hill, S. C.

Persons in Henderson county who have had experience as hunting, fishing or travel guides, and those who own hunting dogs are urged to register at the office here.

A number of changes have been made in the opening and closing dates of hunting seasons in this county by the state department of conservation and development, S. S. Whitaker, county game warden, announced today.

Seasons for hunting were announced as follows: Quail, December 1 to February 15.

Grouse, December 1 to January 16.

Rabbit, November 24 to February 15.

Opussum and racoon, with gun and dogs, October 1 to February 15.

Mr. Whitaker stated that hunting licenses were now on sale at a number of places in the county.

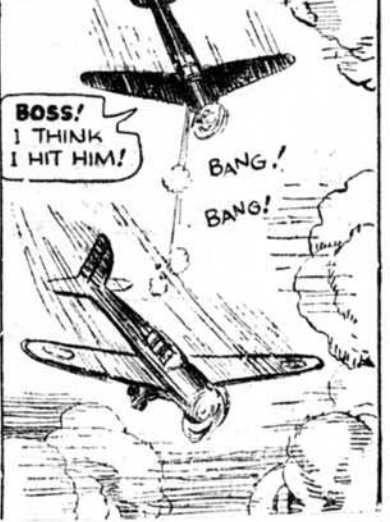
