### AMERICAN FENIANS.

A Brigade of Irish Fenians Being Raised in America to Aid El Mahdi in the Soudan.

The Centers of the Organization Hard at Work—A Large Fund Collected to Defray Expenses.

The Quota from Chicago Well Armed and Equipped and Ready to Start for the East.

#### WAR AGAINST ENGLAND.

CHICAGO, ILL., Feb. 28.—According to a circumstantial narrative to appear in the later issue to-morrow, the Fenian organizations have been revived in this country and an active movement has been put on foot to organize two or more full regiments, of 1000 men each, for service in the Soudan, to operate with El Mahdi against the British. This is based upon the following order, a copy of which has been forwarded to several commanders of previous councils in this city:

HEADQUARTERS OF THE FENIAN BROTHERHOOD, 305 DUANE ST., N. Y., Feb. 7, 1885.  
A meeting of the centers of the circles represented in the following named cities will be held at their respective headquarters as early as may be before the 10th inst. to take such measures as may be necessary to organize each their quota of 200 men for an Irish brigade for active service in Egypt in the interests of El Mahdi in his struggle for liberty. Immediately upon organization the names of the quota will be forwarded to the Hickman street office in New York of Jeremiah O'Donovan Rossa:

New York, 200 men.  
Philadelphia, 100 men.  
Boston, 200 men.  
Buffalo, 200 men.  
Chicago, 200 men.

Your circle will take immediate measures to raise for its contingent the sum of \$100,000, which sum it will forward by officers in temporary command of the men. Each man of your quota must be guaranteed by the center of the city whence he comes. Married men will not be accepted.

The article professes to give the names of prominent ex-officers of the Union and Confederate armies as having been commissioned to serve as officers in the brigade, and Gen. FitzHugh Lee of Virginia is named as the probable commander of the brigade. It is declared that the quota from this city has already been organized and the money raised, and that the men will all have left for the East within the next two weeks. It is claimed that Marseilles, France, will be the probable rendezvous prior to leaving for Egypt.

#### PORT SMITH.

A Bevy of Criminals Receive Their Sentences.

FORT SMITH, ARK., Feb. 28.—The following criminals were sentenced today in the United States court: Stephen Holt, assault with intent to kill, two years at hard labor; Jas. Fletcher, for the same offense, received eighteen months; Ben Rogers, Emanuel Lewis, Louis Webster, Robert Dunford, Billy Wilson, York May and Maxey Butler, convicted of larceny, received one year each. Hiram Blankenship and Jack Smith for larceny received three years each; Stephen Fletcher for manslaughter, three years. All of them go to the house of correction at Detroit, Mich.

#### Obituary at Del Rio.

KYLE, TEX., Feb. 27.—Col. S. D. Jackson received a telegram to-day from Del Rio announcing the death at 5 o'clock this morning of his son, Nat. The deceased was only twenty-four years old at the time of his death. He was a young man of many sterling qualities. He was sick only six days. The remains will be brought home and interred in the Kyle cemetery Sunday morning at 10 o'clock.

#### Suicide at New Braunfels.

NEW BRAUNFELS, TEX., Feb. 28.—William Buhlmaier, twenty-one years old, was found dead in his bed this morning with a pistol bullet through his heart. He had been despondent for some days, and yesterday he secured a pistol and got a friend to describe to him the exact location of the heart. He left some letters, one of which was inscribed in German: "Poor Human Blood." No cause is assigned. He was buried this evening.

#### An Eye on Oklahoma Boomers.

WICHITA, KAN., Feb. 28.—Gen. Hatch arrived here from Arkansas City to-day. In an interview he said that he has twenty companies in the territory and will post his pickets on the Salt Fork guarding every road leading into Oklahoma, and will prevent the boomers from reaching their destination. If they attempt to pass through his lines their stock will be killed and themselves arrested, and this time they will have a trial. There are three clerks busily engaged in the boomers' office at Arkansas City. The cash receipts for membership, he thinks, amount to about \$100 per day. The greatest activity prevails among the boomers. Every building was burned by the troops last summer and every fence cut down. The general says his orders are iron-clad.
