MAIL SUBSCRIBERS.

We have been sending notices to many subscribers, asking them to remit the amount of their subscription to date and for a year or part of a year in advance. We have been, and must be, insistent because of a ruling of the postoffice department, which is that a newspaper owner cannot allow a subscriber to owe more than three months if the paper is a daily and more than one year if a weekly.

We have asked the payment to date and for a year or part of the year in advance, because the mail subscription price of this paper is payable in advance and for the further and more particular reason that we shall not be called on to bother the subscriber again for some time.

Most of those who have come in to pay up have done so cheerfully and willingly. A few have seemed put out because they did not understand the notice, and some of them have stopped the paper. We are writing for the benefit of the latter. We have meant to offend no one by asking for the money due us. We cannot run on wind alone and some thousands of dollars are owing us from our mail subscribers alone. The beginning of the year is a good time to start all payments. We cannot afford to mail notices very often, as it costs \$20 for stamps alone.

For these reasons we not only ask all subscribers to pay up to date, but also for some time in advance, in no case for over the year. This seems to us a reasonable request, when it is recalled that all subscriptions are really payable in advance.

NIGHT WATCHMAN COMMITS SUICIDE

Phoned to Employer Five Minutes Before He Fires Fatal Shot That He Is Tired of Living.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Dec. 27.—"I am tired of living, you had better get another man to take my place," were the words spoken over the telephone by Avery Shanklin to his superintendent five minutes before he fired the shot which snuffed out his life. Shanklin, who was about 21 years of age, was employed at the Lexington Roller mills as a night watchman.

Monday evening he came into the office of the mill where Mr. Joseph Chandler was taking the day watch, until it was time for Shanklin to go on duty at midnight. Going to the telephone he called up Mr. W. W. Patterson, the superintendent of the mill, who lives at the corner of Fourth street and Maple avenue.

Tired of Life, He Says. When Mr. Patterson came to the telephone Shanklin told him that he

was tired of living, and that he had best see about getting another night watchman in his place. Fearing that Shanklin would harm himself, Patterson hurried down town as fast as possible, arriving at the mill about 20 minutes later. Shanklin was not in the office when he arrived, and Chandler said that he told him that he was going to the lockers, which are situated on the fourth floor, to get some clothes.

Chandler had by one pretext or another kept Shanklin in the office for about five minutes, and when he went out Chandler remained behind, fear-

ing that the man was insane and might do him some bodily harm if interfered with.

Body Is Found.

A search was immediately instituted by Mr. Patterson and Mr. J. D. Tate, who is also employed at the mill. The result was the finding of Shanklin's body lying on its back on the floor of the fourth story of the building. He had gone to the lockers and removed his tie, collar and coat before firing the shot. The body was lying about half way between the lockers and the stairway leading down, by which he had come up.
