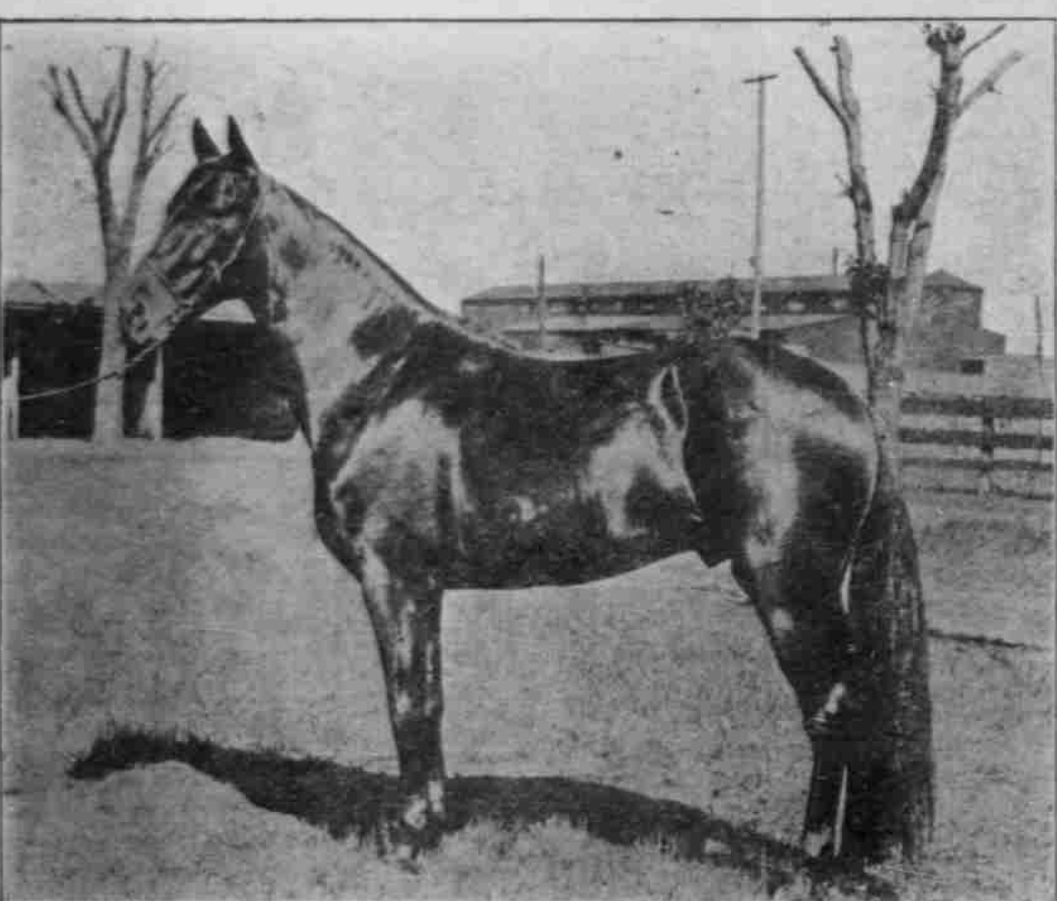

NEWS NOTES

Anderson and Warren counties are in the throes of a prohibition election.

What is planned as the largest parade yet held in the interest of woman suffrage will take place in New York May 3.

Postmaster General Burleson, it is stated, may retain as Second Assistant Joseph Stewart, Republican who is said to be an expert.

Robert Wickliffe Woolley, formerly of Lexington, will be appointed Assistant Secretary of the Treasury by Secretary McAdoo.

Antonio Cicciotti, charged by Enrico Caruso, opera tenor, with having attempted to extort \$15,000 from Jim Thro' a "Black Hand" letter, was found guilty.

Because his negro chauffeur was twice arrested for violating the speed law, Gov. Blease of South Carolina, threatens to place Columbia under martial law.

House leaders propose to make support of the tariff program a prerequisite to desirable assignments and will oppose the naming of legislative committees until after revision is completed.

Washington police officials told the committee investigating alleged indifference of officers to the suffrage parade, that the department was handicapped by too small a police force and to big a crowd.

An order restraining Postmaster General Burleson from putting the provisions of the newspaper publicity law into effect until the Supreme Court renders its opinion, was asked by the newspapers testing the law.

About half the population of the United States is protected by fraternal insurance. On January 1, 1912, there were 7,250,000 beneficiary certificates in force in this country, of which one-seventh, or over, were held in the Modern Woodmen Society.

The application of wholesale liquor dealers of Virginia for an injunction to restrain the Southern Express Company from refusing to accept liquor for shipment to points in South Carolina under the Webb-Kenyon bill, was refused by Judge Waddell, of the United District Court.

Although it is believed the House and Senate will favor the exemption of farmers and labor unions from anti-trust prosecution indications are that the next Congress will obey the wishes of President Wilson and not attempt to place "riders" on the Sundry Civil bill.

James M. Harp, of Frankfort, a Confederate veteran, died sun in the Frankfort circuit court seeking a writ of mandamus to compel State Auditor Bosworth to issue a warrant in his favor for \$76.67, the amount of his February pension. This suit will test the constitutionality of the Confederate pension act. Hazelrigg & Hazelrigg and Jas. Blackburn, Jr., are his attorneys.
