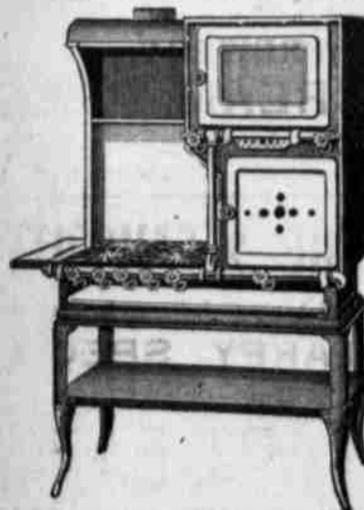

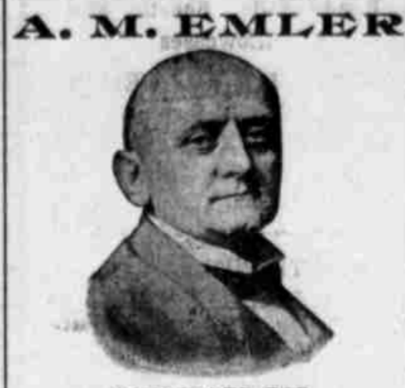

IRELAND.
Record of the Most Important of the Recent Events Culled From Exchanges.
While engaged in prayer in the Dominican church at Newry Felix Campbell, aged eighty, died suddenly.
Thomas O'Boyle, of Claremorris, has been elected permanent engineer to the Castlebar District Council and Board of Guardians.
The death occurred on March 1 of the Rev. M. Lavelle, of Killocony, at the age of sixty-six. The news has caused deep regret in the diocese of Tuam.
Two captures of illicit stills have just been made by the Inishowen police. The most important was in the mountainous district of Glengad, near Malin.
Over 1,000 mourners attended the funeral of Henry Mesall, in Macroom. The Urban Council adjourned their meeting as a mark of respect to the deceased.
Mrs. Magrath, aged 112, of Wolfhill, Queen's county, still lives, and can recall the famine, and tell many incidents connected with it, and with the days of O'Connell.
At Longford Assizes Judge Holmes said that the calendar showed that the assizes would be light the county was in a peaceful state, and he hoped it would long remain so.
As the wedding guests were leaving her house for the church on the morning of her daughter's wedding, Mrs. Storey, of Killocony, near Belinbeg, suddenly expired. Death was due to heart disease.
James J. Hewson, of Adare, County Limerick, was found dead near his residence with a bullet wound in his head. He had gone rabbit shooting on the previous evening, and apparently in climbing a wall the gun had accidentally gone off.
At Clare Assizes Justice Ross, in an appeal by the County Council, affirmed with costs a decision of Judge Bodkin, awarding Patrick Buckley, of Newmarket-on-Fergus, \$250 for damages to his house during blasting operations by workmen of the council.
Daniel Keane, the oldest inhabitant of Keshville, near Macroom, has passed away, having attained the remarkable age of 106 years. The deceased had lived in Nettleville all his life, and up to the closing days of his career had a fine, clear intellect.
A very interesting revival is being undertaken by the Rev. T. J. Kelly, of Athlone, who in connection with the parish church is erecting a round tower of very considerable proportions. The round tower will be a reproduction of the historic pile in the neighboring and better known district of Clonmacnoise.
The death occurred at the Presentation Convent, Maynooth, of Mother Mary Bernard McNamara, in the ninety-fifth year of her age. During her religious life of seventy-four years the deceased lady attended to the duties of her sacred calling with the utmost zeal, and her loss is deeply mourned by the community.
Addressing the grand jury at Wicklow Assizes Judge Gibson said there were only three trivial cases for their consideration. The condition of the county was as usual satisfactory and peaceable and it was his pleasing duty once more to convey to them his sincere congratulations on the very excellent character of the local community.

CATHOLICS ADVANCING.
In a recent interview Cardinal Arcoveado, Archbishop of Rio Janeiro, said that Catholicity was keeping pace with the material advance of Brazil, one of the reasons being that certain liberties, denied her under the monarchy, had been restored under the republic. With regard to the formation of a distinctively Catholic political party, he personally did not see any positive need of it, as it is possible to be a good Catholic in any of the existing parties. What was important, and a very legitimate means of defence, was to refuse to vote for any candidate hostile to Catholic rights.
