CORONATION ANNIVERSARY.

No special festivities were ar-

ranged for celebrating the sixth an-

ni-versary of the coronation of Ben-

edict XV. as Pope. The Pontiff re-

ceived a number of congratulatory

telegrams from sovereigns and heads

of States. Baron Bervens, the Bel-

gian Envoy to the Holy See, pre-

sented his credentials Saturday, and

the occasion was taken for elevating

him to an Ambassadorship.

SEPTEMBER INTENTION.

The general intention recommended by Pope Benedict XV. for members of the League of the Sacred Heart during the month of September is foreign missions. In recommending to the prayers of the Associates of the Apostleship of Prayer the interests of the Catholic foreign missions our Holy Father would impress upon us what he urged in his apostolic letter of November 30, 1919, written to the Bishops of the Catholic world. Christ's command to teach all nations was not limited to apostolic days. In all ages of the church missionaries have gone forth from home and native land to bring the faith to those who were in the darkness of paganism. We ourselves possess the blessing of being members of the Catholic Church because of former missionary zeal. Gratitude should prompt us to take a deep interest in helping to bring spiritual happiness to those who as yet do not know Christ and his church. The missions must be helped. Priests, brothers and sisters are needed. Millions of souls stretch forth their hands pleading for someone to teach them the truths of salvation. Will you answer the call? Could you not be a missionary? If you can not go, then at least you can help our missionaries financially and by your prayers. Put a self-denial bank in your home and frequently put in it for the missions the price of some pleasure given up for God's interests.

DOMINICANS IN IRELAND.

The seventh centenary anniversary of St. Dominic was the occasion of special religious celebrations at the Dominican churches in Ireland. In St. Xavier's church, Dominick street, Dublin, there was a triduum, at which the discourses were delivered by Father O'Farrell, O. P., Father O'Neill, O. P., and Father Louis Ryan, O. P. The relic of the saint, which had been exposed for veneration, was carried in procession after benediction each evening. Not only was this the seventh centenary of St. Dominic's death but it also approaches the seventh centenary of the introduction of the Dominicans into Ireland. One of the brethren who witnessed the miracle of the loaves in the refectory of St. Sixtus in Rome was, said Father Carr, an Irishman who three years after St. Dominic's death came to Ireland, bringing some of the brethren with him. The Dominicans in the penal days helped to preserve the true faith in all its fervor in this country. Dermot O'Hurley, Archbishop of Cashel, the cause of whose beatification was comparatively recently investigated in Rome, patiently bore the corrosive plasters laid on his flesh before he was put to death. Richard Barry, Prior of Cashel, refused life and liberty at the price of divesting himself of his religious garb. Lawrence O'Farrell, of Longford, hanging on the scaffold, lifted his rosary beads in triumph in the air. And the rosary is still the favorite devotion in rural Ireland.

JUSTICE FOR IRELAND.

Delegates of the National Fraternal Congress of the United States and Canada, representing 10,000,000 members, representing all creeds and denominations, in their annual convention in Chicago, by unanimous vote adopted the following:

"In the permanent interest of justice, fraternity and humanity, and for the future welfare of all nations and peoples, we express the deep and sincere hope that the negotiations now pending between Great Britain and Ireland will result in a speedy, reasonable and permanent adjustment."

Extending to the people of Ireland our sincere congratulations upon the sublime fortitude and heroism which they have displayed in their battle for liberty and independence, the Catholic Order of Foresters further say:

"No lover of human liberty can conscientiously withhold from the Irish people in their struggles his sympathy and moral support. We believe that the people of Ireland are morally entitled to establish a government of their own choice, free and independent. As loyal Americans we request that the best efforts of our Government be used to the end that the peace of justice may come speedily to the long suffering people of Ireland."

ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATED.

Monday was the seventieth anniversary of the founding of St. Mary's parish, Madison, Ind. The event was celebrated by the consecration of the high altar by Right Rev. Bishop Chartrand, who was attended by six clergymen, sons of the congregation. Rev. George Smith, Rev. Alphonse Smith, Rev. Henry Hanger, Rev. Clement Zent, Rev. Francis Hillen and Rev. Albert Schadt. Many other priests, including those of the Madison deanery, were in attendance.

FRANCISCAN PROVINCIAL.

The Franciscan Chapter of this province, in session at Cincinnati last week, made a number of changes. The Rev. Edmund Klein, O. F. M., who was Guardian at the house in Cincinnati, was elected Provincial, succeeding the Very Rev. Rudolph Bonner, O. F. M. The Rev. Father Theobald was chosen as Vicar. The Rev. Linus Braun, Guardian of St. Boniface Monastery, this city, attended the chapter.

SAVE ANIMAL LIFE.

Word has reached Chicago that Pope Benedict XV. has lately sent a contribution of \$200, through Cardinal Gasparri, to the Roman Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals. In addition, it is stated, the Cardinal was directed to send a letter condemning all wanton destruction of animal life by unscrupulous sportsmen who caused untold suffering to the victims by traps and similar devices.

ADMIRAL IN GEORGIA.

Admiral William S. Benson, one of Georgia's most distinguished sons, and one of the leading sons of the church in America, will deliver the principal address at the sixth annual convention of the Catholic Laymen's Association of Georgia at Atlanta on Sunday, September 11.
