Dr. S. J. Wedding, city, who for the past six years has been a member of the Board of Health of Ohio county and secretary of the Board and also County Health Officer, sent his resignation to the State Board of Health at Bowling Green Monday. Dr. Wedding resigned on account of failing health and loss of time from his practice.

The Hartford basketball team defeated the Louisville team last Saturday night, the score being 41 to 18. The Louisville team was composed mainly of strong and skilled players, but they showed the lack of the splendid training and team work that our boys had, and lost the game on that principle, though they tried hard to win.

The total attendance of the Sunday Schools of Hartford, composed of the Baptist, Methodist, Christian and Presbyterian schools, last Sunday amounted to 237, or a little over one-third of the total population of the entire town. Those actively engaged in Sunday school work hope to not only keep up this good attendance, but make a substantial increase.

The Board of Supervisors composed of E. F. Bender, Beaver Dam, Route 2; T. H. Benton, Centertown; W. T. Ketch, Fortville; W. C. Wallace, Hartford, Route 3, and A. F. McKelvey, Oxford, Route 1, reconvened last Monday to hear the evidence against the sale of his or her property. (Mr. L. B. Loney, clerk of the Board, is also present. The Board will be in session until this afternoon.

Mrs. Nancy Alford, better known as "Aunt Nancy", widow of the late Rev. P. H. Alford, and who is making her home in Hartford with her daughter, Mrs. J. E. Davidson, celebrated her ninety-fourth birthday yesterday.

Next Friday night the Hartford basketball team will play against Greenville, at Hartford. Greenville has played some of the strongest games for amateurs in Western Kentucky this season, but our boys consider the game will be hotly contested by them.

Dr. J. W. Taylor, city, who is a member of the Board of Health of Ohio county, was in Rockport Tuesday to confer with physicians at that place concerning the smallpox situation in that vicinity. He was sent to Rockport by County Judge Wedding, who is chairman of the Board of Health.

Mr. A. M. Downing, of Yrman, Ky., brother-in-law of Rev. W. S. Wheeler, of East Hartford, took some hen eggs to market recently, and one egg in the lot was of unusual size, being about the size of a goose egg. They were sold to Mr. W. T. Hopper at that place and when the wife broke the large egg she found the white as usual, but next to the white instead of the yolk was a perfectly formed and hard egg shell, really making an egg within an egg.

WARNED TO KEEP OUT OF MARKET

But Equity Men Disclaim Responsibility for Attempt to Block Buyer.

Marion, Ky., January 27.—Considerable excitement was created here Saturday afternoon when Dr. L. L. Moore, who had just bought the crops of three independent tobacco growers, was approached by a man who said to him that he was a member of the Equity Society in this county, and was one of a committee appointed by the local society to wait upon those buyers who had the temerity to buy independent, or unapproved, tobacco, and request that they buy no more tobacco. Dr. Moore told the man that he intended to continue buying.

Later prominent members of the society here stated to Dr. Moore that there would be no interference by their society with his operations. They also repudiated the statement made by the man that he was a member of any committee for the purpose stated, and intimated that they had no intention of committing any acts of violence, or of intimidating any one.

There has been a fear here that there would yet be trouble before the tobacco was all sold and delivered.
