It has developed that Hon. L. T. Neat, the Republican nominee for State Senator in this the 16th Senatorial district, is not eligible for the position should he be elected by reason of his citizenship in New Mexico less than six years ago. The Republican district Committee will meet in Monticello to-morrow night (Wednesday) at 9 o'clock for the purpose of nominating another candidate. Several persons have been mentioned as suitable candidates, but it is not known which one will be selected.

Prof. [John] Wilson Townsend, at a meeting of the Filson Club, in Louisville, one evening last week, read a paper entitled "Kentucky the Mother of Governors." He showed that 102 sons of Kentucky have become Governors of different States. He said that fifteen have been Governors of Missouri. Among these were David H. Francis and William J. Stone. Illinois has had thirteen Governors who were natives of Kentucky. Nine Kentuckians have occupied the executive mansion in Montana, and Ohio has had seven Governors who originally lived in Kentucky. Mr. Townsend closed his papers with the suggestion that bronze tablets be placed in the capital building at Frankfort bearing the names of these men who have gone out from Kentucky and made themselves famous. The suggestion met with favor and it is likely that a movement will be made toward this end.

Gov. Willson has requested Judge Alex P. Humphrey, Col. Andrew Cowan, of Louisville; O. H. Waddle, Somerset; T. L. Edelen, Frankfort; John R. Allen, Lexington; John F. Hager, Ashland; L. J. Crawford, Newport; Jere Sullivan, Richmond, and C. U. McElroy, Bowling Green, to act as a commission to prepare a redistricting bill to be submitted to the next Legislature. Judge Humphrey is named as chairman.

United States Consul General Hanna, at Monterey, Mexico,

telegraphed that the condition of Mexican people in and about that city were more serious than any of the printed reports thus far would seem to indicate.

The verdict of the trial court which found John R. Walsh guilty of misappropriation of the Chicago National Bank funds was affirmed by the United States Circuit Court of Appeals at Chicago and he serves five years.

Mr. Dick Hutchison is building a large barn on his place. Mr. Perry Cundiff is the boss hand of building large, nice barns.


