GENERAL NEWS.

L. and N. gross earnings for the second week of March show an increase of \$49,700, compared with the corresponding week of last year.

Cappie Davis shot and killed Joe Miller at Sunny Dale, and a family feud may result. Miller's son had married Davis' sister, and out of this trouble grew.

Money is being raised by an endless chain scheme to get defense money for Frank Miller, the Birmingham safe blower, who is under sentence to hang.

Cloverport, Ky., and Memphis, Ind., each encountered a loss by fire amounting to about \$300,000 to the former, and \$100,000 to the latter. Many people were made destitute by reason of it. St. Louis also had a loss of about \$100,000.

A wealthy Southern woman has offered homes to fifty poor couples of New York. The Plant system offers free transportation and employment will be given those who accept.

The steel trust has absorbed the Rockefeller mining, shipping and railway interests, and it is reported that the capital of the United States Company will be increased by \$100,000,000.

Cappie Davis, aged twenty-two, shot and killed Joe Miller, aged fifty, in Ohio county. The killing resulted from trouble between the families.

Prof. Willis L. Moore has called the triennial convention of Weather Bureau officials at Milwaukee August 27 to 29 next.

M. Dewitte, the Russian Minister of Finance, has sent a semi-official notice to Germany, declaring that he was not responsible for the press attacks on Count von Buelow.

Fire at Buford, Ohio county, Tuesday, destroyed Cook Bros. general store, King's livery stable, Hoover's tobacco warehouse, the Buford postoffice and an unoccupied dwelling. There was no insurance except on Hoover's warehouse.

There is a big split in Grayson county, between Populists and Democrats over a division of the spoils in the fusion arrangement.

Willis Methers, a small boy, near Jeffersonville, was killed while trying to see how close a train would come to him without hitting him.

It has been discovered by the investigating committees of lawyers that affidavits filed at Frankfort were signed in lead pencil.

The injunction suit of Herman Kaiser, the masseur, against T. B. Owen, the bowling alley proprietor, has been dismissed "settled."

Beginning Monday the Supreme Court will take a two weeks' vacation, and it is the opinion that the Constitution and the Flag case will not be decided until the court reconvenes.

Consul Ben Ridgely reports that Spain is to make an attempt to cultivate coffee at home. While Spain was in possession of Cuba and Porto Rico the bean was not grown on the peninsula.

Panama Canal stock has developed life on the assumption that the next Congress will give the President discretionary authority in the matter of the canal route.

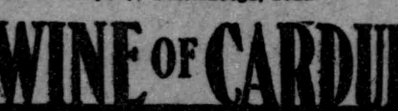

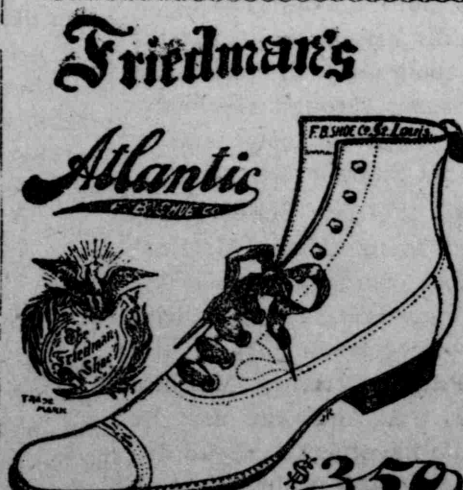
