SCINTILLATIONS.

An Interesting Jumble Of News And Comment.

Benjamin Zess, 16, died at South Bend, Ind., from too much cigarette smoke.

Elijah Coleman, was frozen to death last week while sleeping in a barn near Corinth. He was drunk. Hogs had eaten off his ears and nose.

Lewis county gained a step in the direction of free turnpikes Friday when the stockholders of one turnpike decided to transfer it to the county.

John Russ and James Carroll, both negroes, have been arrested at Georgetown, charged with assassinating Alvin D. Wright in his own yard, near that city, two years ago.

Farmer William Divine, of Mercer county, returned to his home Saturday afternoon to find that his wife had been outraged and murdered in his absence. He dead body lay upon the floor with her two babies beside it. There is no clew to the murderer.

Robert Laughlin was hanged at Brooksville Saturday morning for the murder of his wife and May Jones, his niece. The gallows had been inclosed with a high fence in order to make the execution private, but the crowd on the outside tore the barrier down and saw Laughlin drop through the trap. The murderer made a full confession of his guilt to ex-Sheriff Frank. See Brooksville dispatch on second page.

The action for divorce brought by Mrs. Emma T. Cecil, of Danville, against her husband, Granville Cecil, has been compromised out of court. Articles of separation were agreed upon, under which Mrs. Cecil is to get \$25,000, besides an annuity of \$1,000 for herself, and an income sufficient to support and educate the youngest child, a daughter. She in turn relinquishes all dower and other rights in the property of her husband. Cecil pays her attorneys' fees of \$1,500 and all court costs.
