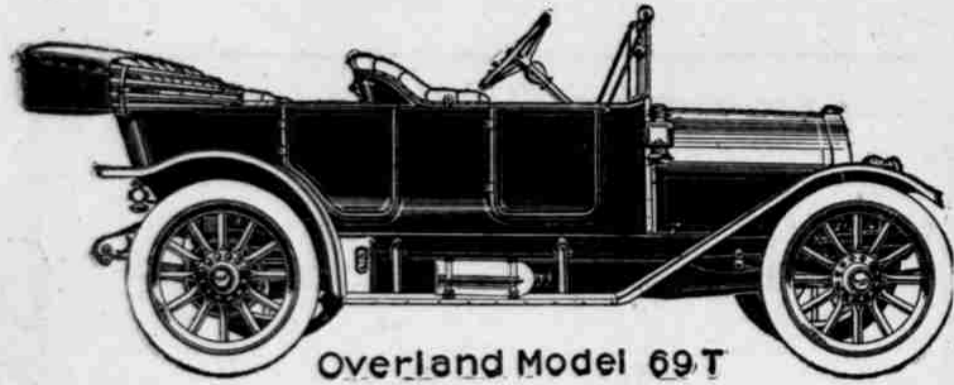

Hinton Wins in Committeemen's Fight.

A sweeping endorsement of the present city administration resulted from the election of committeemen in this city Saturday when five of the six precincts in Paris selected committeemen favorable to Mayor J. T. Hinton.

The election of committeemen was a source of great interest, the opposition having out candidates in each of the city precincts and the choices were made after a spirited contest. The anti-Hinton faction succeeded in landing only one of the committeemen, that being Mr. M. J. Murphy in the third precinct, who defeated Dr. A. H. Keller. In precinct No. 1 E. B. Hedges was elected, by a narrow margin over H. O. James; Whittington Mann defeated R. K. McCarney in No. 2. C. J. Lancaster was victorious over George Rassenfoss in No. 4, while John Cain was elected without opposition in No. 5 and J. W. Thomas defeated Lee Beall in No. 6.

The newly elected members of the county committee met at the court house yesterday morning at ten o'clock for the election of a chairman and secretary. The meeting resulted in the election of W. D. McIntyre as chairman and W. G. Talbot, secretary. Neither had opposition.

Warning to Hunters.

The State and County Game and Fish Wardens have been instructed by J. Q. Ward, Executive Agent, to be on the outlook for violators of the game and fish laws, and arrest and prosecute any one found hunting without first procuring a license for the current year. All license issued last year expired December 31st, and licenses for this year are now in the hands of the County Clerk, Pearce Paton, and are good from date of issue to December 1, 1913. Hunters are allowed to hunt on their own land or adjoining land with consent of owners without license.

New Enterprise Opens.

A new enterprise which bids fair to take its place in the front rank of those of this city is the new garage supply and repair shop of Yerkes & Prichard which has been opened by this popular firm in the building opposite the Agricultural Bank.

The recent remodeling of the building has made it particularly adaptable for this sort of business. In the rear of the main building there has been constructed a brick storage room extending through to Pleasant street. The flooring of this part of the building is in concrete and this department is fitted with every convenience to the care of automobiles.

A section of the first floor of the main building will be used as a display room and already the firm has on display a number of the 1913 models of the Buick automobile, for which they are the local agents. The second floor will be fitted out with modern machinery and this portion will be used as a machine shop while the rear of the first floor will be used for repairing. The storage room furnishes ample space for a large number of automobiles and is easily accessible from the Pleasant street entrance. Everything for the convenience of auto owners is being arranged and the firm without charge will store machines for twenty-four hours. This feature should have the effect of inducing owners of machines to use their storage room instead of leaving their cars standing in the streets, either during the day or night.
