INCORPORATION ACT.

PURPOSES FOR WHICH PRIVATE CORPORATIONS MAY BE FORMED.

The Bill last sent to the Governor for His Signature and will take Effect Ninety Days from Passage.

In view of the probability that Gov. Hogg will sign the new incorporation law, and that, as enrolled, it has never been given to the public, THE GAZETTE below gives the bill as it went to the governor from the conference committee.

Perfectly perfected by conference committee, submitted to the governor the general incorporation act reads:

An act to amend an act, entitled "an act to amend article 566, chapter 2, title 20 of the Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, as amended by the Twentieth legislature, approved March 23, 1887, and as amended at the special session of the Twentieth legislature, approved April 30, 1888, so as amended as hereinafter read as follows:

Section 1. Be it enacted by the legislature of the State of Texas, that article 566 of chapter 2, title 20, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, as amended by the Twentieth legislature, approved March 23, 1887, and as amended at the special session of the Twentieth legislature, approved April 30, 1888, be so amended as to hereinafter read as follows:

Article 566. The purposes for which private corporations may be formed are:

1. The support of public worship.

2. The support of any benevolent, charitable, educational or missionary undertaking.

3. The support of any literary undertaking, the maintenance of a library, the promotion of painting, music or other fine arts.

4. The encouragement of agriculture and horticulture by associations for the maintenance of public fairs and exhibitions of stock and farm products.

5. The maintenance of a public or private cemetery.

6. The construction and maintenance of any species of road and bridges in connection therewith.

7. The construction and maintenance of a bridge which may be used for any or all of the purposes of travel and transportation.

8. The construction and maintenance of a telegraph and telephone line.

9. The establishment and maintenance of a ferry.

10. The establishment and maintenance of a line of stages.

11. The building and navigation of steamboats and vessels and the carriage of passengers and property.

12. The supply of water to the public.

13. The manufacture and supply of gas, or of the supply of light, heat and electric motor power, or either of them to the public by any means.

14. The transaction of any manufacturing or mining business.

15. The transaction of a printing or publishing business, and in connection therewith the sale of goods, wares and merchandise of a stationery and blank book manufacturing business.

16. The establishment and maintenance of a hotel.

17. The erection of buildings and accumulation and loan of funds for the purchase and sale of real property in cities, towns and villages and their suburbs.

18. The transportation of goods, wares and merchandise, or any valuable thing.

19. The promotion of immigration.

20. The construction and maintenance of sewers.

21. The construction and maintenance of a street railway and suburban or belt lines of railway within and near cities and towns, which may also construct, own or operate union depots; but no street railway company shall ever be exempt from the payment of assessments that may be legally levied and charged against it for street improvements.

22. The erection and maintenance of market houses and market places.

23. The construction and maintenance of canals for the purpose of irrigation, navigation or manufacturing.

24. The purchase and sale of goods, wares and merchandise and agricultural and farm products, and the transaction of business incorporating for such purposes, shall in no instance be less than ten nor shall any person hold or own more than \$500 of such stock, and any person owning or holding more than \$500 of such stock shall be liable for all the debts of such corporation.

25. For the purpose of buying and selling goods, wares and merchandise, or any description by wholesale. But the limitations upon stock and stockholders in corporations created under subdivision of this article shall not apply to corporations created under this subdivision.

26. The construction of harbors and canals on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico.

27. The growing, purchasing and selling of seeds, plants, trees, etc., for horticultural, horticultural and ornamental purposes.

28. The construction and maintenance of mills, cins, cotton presses, grain elevators and warehouses.

29. The accumulation and loan of money; but this subdivision shall not permit incorporation with banking or discounting privileges.

30. The construction and maintenance of stockyards and pens.

31. The construction and maintenance of establishments for the slaughtering, refrigerating, canning, curing and packing of meats.

32. The construction and maintenance of establishments for the preserving and canning of fruits, vegetables and fish.

33. The establishment and maintenance of a clearing house.

34. To construct and maintain water power.

35. For the purpose of constructing railroad bridges for railroad companies.

36. To support and maintain bicycle clubs and other innocent sport.

37. To act as trustee or assignee or receiver when designated by a person, corporation or court so to do and to do a general fiduciary and depository business. To act as surety and guarantor of the fidelity of an agent, or to act as executor or testamentary guardian when designated as such by a decedent: Provided that each corporation organized under this section shall publish in some newspaper of general circulation in the county where such corporation is organized, on the first day of February of each year, a statement of its condition on the previous 31st day of December, showing under each of its assets and liabilities, and that a copy of this statement be filed with the commissioner of insurance, statistics and history, such examination to be at the expense of the company.

38. For establishing transportation companies with power to buy, construct, lease, own, operate, maintain and convey all kinds of steamships, vessels and other water crafts, and may navigate the same between all ports of the globe and upon rivers, and construct, buy, lease, own, maintain, operate and convey warehouses, docks and wharves, and buy, lease, receive, own, hold and engage real and personal property necessary in the transaction of the business, to receive, purchase, use, hold and convey such rights, privileges, franchises and property and to exercise such powers as may be granted to or conferred upon it by any foreign government, state or municipality; to have officers and agents and to maintain offices at all points at which the company may do business; to act as principal or agent in buying and selling merchandise in all foreign countries; to carry passengers, freight, express and mail.

39. The establishment of land companies to buy, own, sell and convey real estate in any state or foreign country; but such company shall only own such real estate in this state as may be necessary for its office.

The bill takes effect in ninety days.

WILLING TO SHARE PROFITS WITH LANDOWNERS.

Proper Inducements the Only Thing Lacking to Bring About the Rapid Settlement of Tarrant County.

HEADQUARTERS TEXAS OKLAHOMA UNION, SUTHERLAND TARRANT COUNTY, TEX. April 16, 1891.

To the Gazette.

I noticed in THE GAZETTE to-day a short editorial suggesting setting up Tarrant county with people. Being a Tarrant county man as well as an Oklahoma boomer, I am not at all surprised to find that you will soon be back in Washington with the full text of it.

In the first place, what inducements are offered settlers in Tarrant county? Second, what means are employed to let the homeseekers know of these inducements? The answers to those two questions settles the problem. Our colony book to-day shows that ninety-six families of homeseekers have sent in their names to join us and get homes since March 7. There is little doubt but we will have from one to two thousand by January next. Every one of those must settle on this side of Red river for probably a year. They can drive to the Territory in three days from Fort Worth. They can travel almost there in three hours by rail. Do the people of Fort Worth and Tarrant county want them to settle here and await the opening of the Fort Worth country? There is only one reason why it will not be done. Because Tarrant offers no inducements that will attract them. Your capitalists offer a bonus to this big concern, a bonus to that concern, and then double the price on the settlers. Did it never occur to them to offer inducements to men of small means to settle here? Improve their homes and build up this country? Our Texas location will probably be selected and secured this month. Why do I leave Tarrant county to select it? Because I do not know of land owners here that will co-operate with us. If those owning vacant land adjoining Fort Worth want settlers and people in them, let them be and are willing to divide the profit with the settlers that the settlers make the land owners, let them write us at once. It takes people and houses to give value to land. We know what creates that wealth and will give land owners a just divide and no more. Wichita, Wilbarger or Clay county will get the benefits of the settlers only because they are rich and powerful. In Tarrant county's condition they cannot afford to do it. If Fort Worth and Tarrant county want this move centered here let their vacant land owners and people let owners notify me at once what inducements in land bargains they will give our settlers. After ten days it will be too late. We are going to work.
